

CONTRIBUTORS DUE FOR REIMBURSEMENT

\$12,000 Advanced by Patriots to Be Returned by Council of Defense. SUMS TEN CENTS TO \$2,500 Will Not Be Responsible for Money Paid Out to County Defense Councils.

OKLAHOMA CITY, April 15.—Every contributor to the maintenance and operation of the Oklahoma state council of defense is entitled to funds appropriated by the state legislature. Frank claims that neither the office and financial affairs, with blank spaces for signatures, have been sent out to the contributors and returned to Chester H. Westfall, assistant secretary. On receipt of this, corresponding accounts are forwarded to the chairmen of the county councils of defense who were in office at the time the money was made to the state council. Where the county councils sent the money, the same amount is returned to be disposed of at the discretion of the county council.

The sums making the total of \$12,000 reimbursed range in amounts from 10 cents to \$2,500. Several of these personal contributions were of \$1,000, \$500, \$250 and \$100 donations.

"It must be distinctly understood," declared Chester H. Westfall, assistant secretary of the state council of defense, "that only those who were in office at the time the money was made to the state council is under an obligation to return sums of money advanced to county councils of defense. Where any part of the contribution made to the county council of defense was sent to the state council, the state council is returning only those sums which it received."

ALLEGES HE FAILED TO PAY FOR HIS FURNITURE

Averring the defendants has failed to meet the monthly instalments on the payment of \$500 for furniture delivered by the plaintiff suit asking the return of the household goods and an additional sum of \$100 for use of the furniture was filed in superior court Saturday by L. W. Shannon, doing business in Tulsa as the Shannon Furniture company, against James McBride. The plaintiff claims that under the contract upon which the furniture was sold, failure of the purchaser to meet the monthly payments gave the plaintiff the right to immediate possession of the goods and a reasonable sum for the use of the furniture. The plaintiff elects to ask the return of the goods in lieu of judgment for \$200.75, alleged to be due on the original amount of the contract.

BIGGEST PEACH CROP IN FOUR YEARS PREDICTED

SPRINGFIELD, Mo., April 19.—The peach crop of Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas will see the largest since 1915, if later complications do not develop, according to R. J. Duncan, assistant fruit crop specialist of the U. S. department of agriculture with headquarters here. Mr. Duncan has been over the peach section recently on an inspection tour. The damage done by the recent tornado cannot be estimated at present. It is predicted that Arkansas will have a record crop, and Oklahoma an 80 per cent crop. The prospects in Texas are much better than last year, when 1,400 acres of peaches were shipped out of the state, according to Mr. Duncan's report.
