

GREGORY SEES PEACE RATIFICATION HERE

Former Attorney General Returns From Special Mission Abroad With President Wilson.

CONDITIONS SATISFACTORY

Vo Nation Gets All It Wants But All Are Satisfied He Asserted and He Predicts Acceptance.

NEW YORK, April 19.—Thomas W. Gregory, former attorney general who accompanied President Wilson to France as an unofficial adviser on matters connected with the peace conference, returned here today as a passenger on the train from London.

Speaking of the conference and the success of the peace treaty, Mr. Gregory said he returned very fully satisfied that in his opinion the agreement arrived at would be satisfactory to the majority of the people of the United States.

There were numerous difficulties and differences of opinion confronting the delegates, he said, but they were met and settled by the conference as gentlemen. While no country, of course, obtained all it wanted, he believed the position will be generally accepted.

Regarding his own work while abroad, Mr. Gregory said he could say little at this time. He added, however, that a part of it had to do with a special mission for the war department.

He said he had been looking for the possible return home of the bodies of American troops who had died abroad and confirmed cable reports that the work of locating and identifying bodies and handling burials was progressing satisfactorily. The former attorney general said that no finer array of men than the American expeditionary force have ever been assembled.

"They went to France," he asserted, "and subordinated by their demeanor and their fighting ability all that was expected of them and fully upheld the traditions of the American army. They are leaving France with the respect of the world. In all my time abroad, I never saw an intoxicated soldier, nor did I see anything which would tend to lower respect or admiration for our fighters. I must say, however, that they are all anxious to come home and their greatest desire now is to be reabsorbed into the regular life of their own country."

Mr. Gregory asserted that President Wilson's popularity abroad had not waned. The president's present stay in France, however, had been that of a worker, he said, without the acclaim attending his first visit.
