Senate Opponents Continue Conference Today to Express Disapproval.

SENATE COMMITTEE FOR LARGER ARMY.

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Decision of the senate military subcommittee to provide for an army of 400,000 men next fiscal year was upheld by the full committee tonight in considering the army appropriation bill.

WILSON TO NAME COMMISSION SOON.

PARIS, June 20.—President Wilson, it was learned today, has decided to appoint a commission to investigate reported pogroms in Poland. It will consist of seven members, headed by Henry Morgenthau, former ambassador to Turkey.

ITALIANS TO ACCEPT DALMATIAN PLAN.

PARIS, June 20.—The Italian delegation to the peace conference has been directed from Rome to accept the proposition for the settlement of the Dalmatian controversy made by Premier Clemenceau, Lloyd George and President Wilson to the Paris office of Reuters.

150 KILLED IN FIRE IN PICTURE HOUSE.

SAVANNAH, Ga., June 20.—A fire in a picture house here tonight killed 150 persons, including many children, and injured or maimed in the destruction by fire 1000 pictures of a motion picture theater at Savannah.

WEIMAR CUT OFF BY RAIL STRIKE.

WEIMAR, June 19.—Weimar tonight is completely cut off from the rest of Germany because of a suddenly called railway strike. Airplanes and the telegraph are the only means of communication.

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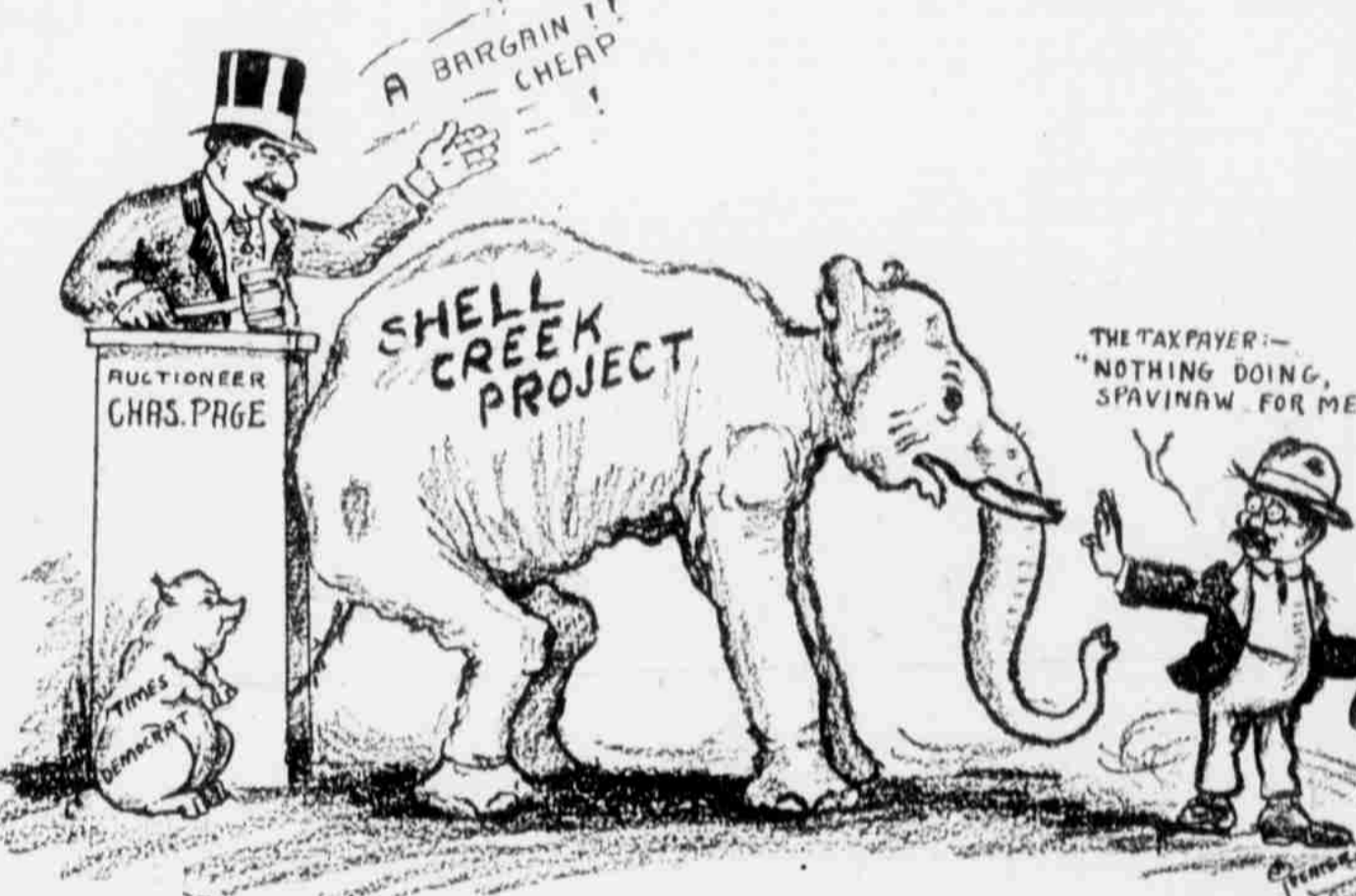

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ACCUSERS ATTACKED SHARPLY BY PALMER

WILSON TO NAME COMMISSION SOON.

PARIS, June 20.—The latest reports received over the military wire from Weimar indicate that at 9 o'clock this evening (Friday) Germany is still in the throes of a reconstruction of the administration in an endeavor to get a government that is capable of signing the peace treaty.

It is expected in Paris that an extension of time will be asked by the Germans if they are unable to agree in the time accorded in the reply to the counter proposals. A member of the American delegation said a short extension of time might be granted under this contingency.

WILSON TO NAME COMMISSION SOON.

PARIS, June 20.—The cabinet resigned at 3 o'clock this morning. President Ebert will retain his office temporarily.

It was stated on good authority today that President Ebert had decided to stand by with Chance for Scheidemann, although Ebert seems to have the advantage on account of his greater adaptability in meeting the desires of the independent.

An independent leader told the correspondents today that it was a matter of indifference to the independent who was chosen, as neither man was liked, but that Noske was least liked because he would antagonize hundreds of thousands of persons who regard him as a "blood-hound and oppressor."

WILSON TO NAME COMMISSION SOON.

PARIS, June 20.—An unconfirmed report received here from the army intelligence bureau at Coblenz says Count von Helldorf, former German ambassador to the United States, has been named as minister of foreign affairs, and that he will come to Versailles to sign the peace treaty.

WILSON TO NAME COMMISSION SOON.

PARIS, June 20.—The Temps indicates that Matthias Erzberger, if he takes power in Germany, will ask two modifications of the peace treaty. The first will be the toning down of the clause concerning responsibility for the war, so as to spare German susceptibilities, and the second abandonment of prosecution of the former emperor.
