OKLAHOMA STATEHOOD BILL.

Senator Fairbanks Introduced it Into the Senate Today.

Washington, Dec. 4.—Senator Fairbanks of Indiana today introduced a bill to admit Oklahoma as a state, with two representatives. The usual provisions for a constitutional convention and the grants of lands for state institutions are made.

Washington, Dec. 5.—Senator Fairbanks said today that he believed the bill which he has introduced in the senate providing statehood for Oklahoma would be passed at this session of congress. Mr. Fairbanks said that he had introduced the bill because he thought the people of Oklahoma were entitled to statehood and because the platform adopted by the Republican national committee had declared for statehood for the territories. The general opinion in both house and senate is that if any territory is admitted to the Union during Mr. McKinley's administration that territory will be Oklahoma. The action of congress at the last session in passing a free homes bill which benefited Oklahoma more than any other section of the country is pointed to as an indication that congress is preparing to take the more advanced step of statehood for that territory.

Delegate Flynn is due in Washington tomorrow. When he arrives he is expected to start the fight for statehood in the house. The understanding is that Chairman Knox of the house committee on territories, while opposed to admitting the other territories to statehood, will favor Oklahoma.

The title of the bill introduced by Senator Fairbanks is, "To enable the people of Oklahoma to form a constitution and state gov-

ernment and to be admitted into the Union on an equal footing with the original states, and to make donations of public lands to said state."

The idea of Mr. Fairbanks and other supporters of statehood is that the new state, when admitted, shall consist of Oklahoma and, later, Indian territory. In accordance with this idea the fifth section of the bill "That Congress may admit into the Union as a part of the proposed state the inhabitants of part of the area of the United States now constituting the Indian territory.

The Senate committee on territories will it is said, give a hearing on the Fairbanks bill early in January.

The Money for the Indians.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The Secretary of the Treasury sent today to Congress estimates of the appropriations required in the various branches of the government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1902. Among the appropriations required in the Indian service is one for an appropriation of 1 1/2 million dollars to carry out the agreement made with the Kiowa, Comanche and Apache Indians, made last June. This agreement provides for the payment to the Indians of 2 million dollars, but officials of the Treasury, when called upon to make the first payment, decide the only one half million dollars of that amount was appropriated by the language of the act ratifying the agreement. The secretary recommends that the balance, one and a half million dollars, be appropriated at once.
