Oklahoma in the Urgency Bill.

Washington, Dec. 18.—The ur-
gent deficiency appropriation bill
has been reported to the House
covering various minor urgent
items, aggregating \$152,500.

One of the items is \$75,000 for
completing the allotments provid-
ed in agreements with the Comman-
che, Kiowa and Apache Indians
in Oklahoma, with a provision
authorizing the secretary of the
Interior to extend the time for
making the allotments and open-
ing the land to settlement not ex-
ceeding eight months from Decem-
ber 6, 1900.
