SOUTH CANADIAN DOES DAMAGE

The bridge across the Canadian at Bridgeport went out Monday; loss about \$125,000. Telephone and telegraph service is in bad shape. The bridge is out at Tedda. One farm house near there was washed away. The Mustang bridge is also out.

The regular trains for Chickasha are being detoured. Much damage has been done all along the river for miles. Several bridges on the K. C. M. and O., the W. F. and N. W. are reported out.

It is reported that J. F. Fiske of Geary, one of the six caught in the river, was rescued Sunday night by men in boats attached to

ropes. Mr. Fiske was in a tree about sixty rods from the shore. He is in a critical condition and may not recover.

Several men are yet in trees far from help and it is believed impossible for them to endure their situation until the flood ends. Two men have not been located.

The South Canadian in the Bridgeport district was never known to be higher than at the present time. Hundreds of citizens stood along the banks of the raging water and watched the dreadful flood.

The debris is chiefly composed of wreckage of bridges, parts of small houses and large trees.
