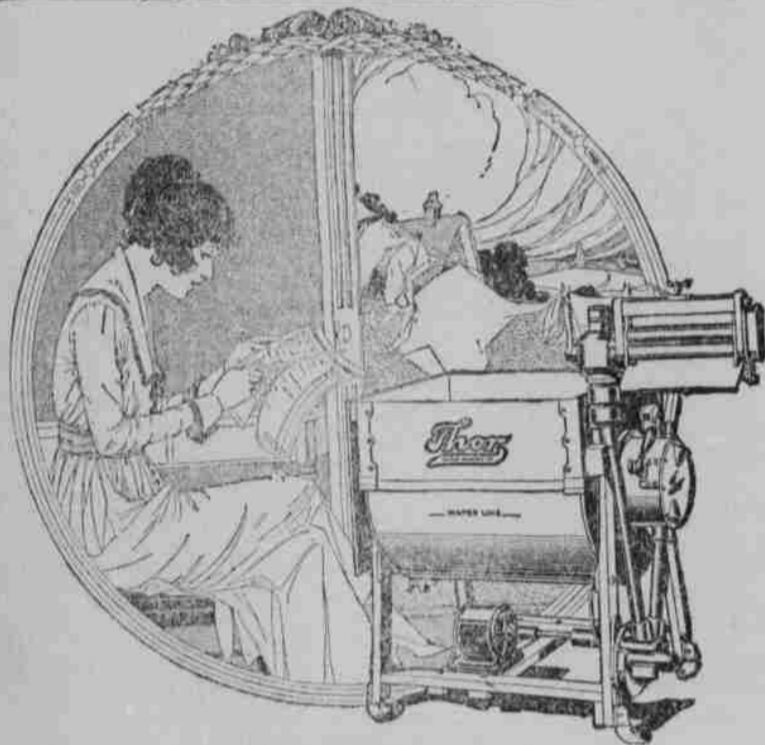

State Now Ready For Record Sale of Health Seals

Oklahoma City, Nov. 30.—With 421 of the largest and most important cities and towns in the state organized for the 1920 Tuberculosis Christmas Seal sale, which begins on December 1 and ends on December 15 is ready for a record-breaking effort to conserve and promote public health.

Twenty million Tuberculosis Christmas seals are in the hands of county and city hairmen and workers, and many thousands have already been sold, far in advance of the opening of the sale. Seventy-six of the 77 counties of the state will take an active part in the drive.

In addition to the Tuberculosis seals, which sell for one cent each the people of Oklahoma will be given an opportunity this year to buy Health Bonds. These are modeled after the familiar Liberty Bond except that they pay dividends on health and happiness. They will be sold in denominations of from \$5 to \$1,000.

Since half the money raised in each county will be spent in that county for public health work, it is expected that the Tuberculosis Christmas Seal sale will surpass previous years by far. The total cash raised each year since the sale began has been larger than the year previous, and if the state reaches its quota of 10 seals per capita, Oklahoma will be at the head of the list of states engaged in public health work, instead of at the foot as at present.

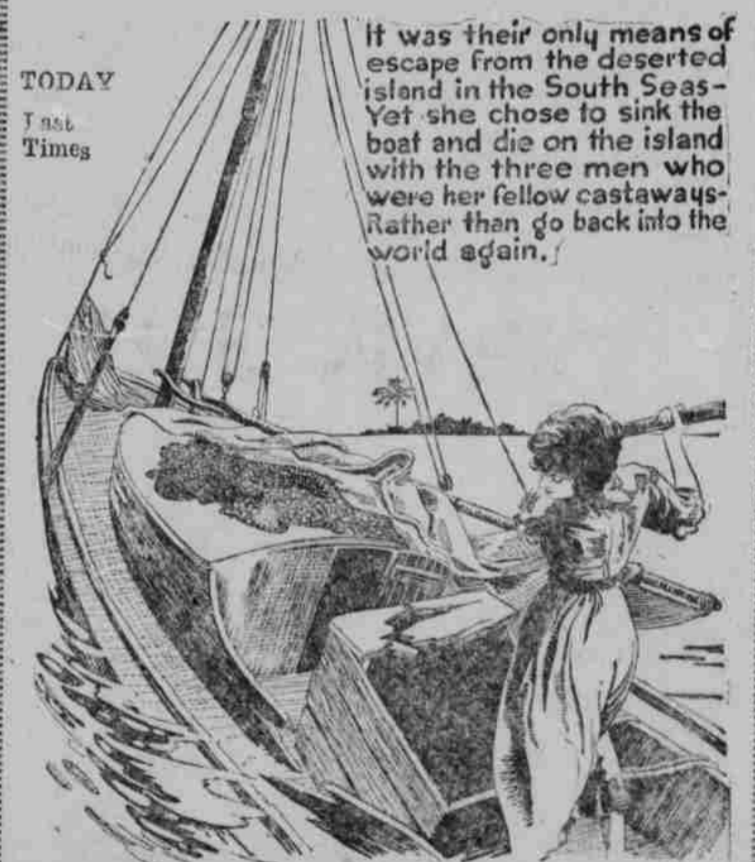
