

TULSA CLEANERS ELECT BOHNEFELD

Bohnefeld and Clipson Chosen as Leaders in District.

CONVENTION CLOSES

Fort Worth Chosen for Next Convention; Time of Meeting Is Changed.

William O. Bohnefeld of Tulsa was elected president of the southwestern district of the National Cleaners and Dyers association, in the closing session of the annual convention of the association yesterday. C. P. Clipson of Tulsa was elected as a director for a period of three years. The convention was closed yesterday after a trip through the oil fields and the Goeben refinery.

More than 200 delegates, including 50 women, attended the convention. The southwestern district of the cleaners and dyers association, includes Oklahoma, Arkansas, Texas, Missouri and Louisiana.

It was decided at the meeting Wednesday morning to change the time of the annual district meeting from June to November, and the next convention will be held in Fort Worth, Texas.

Following the business session Wednesday morning a luncheon was given at the Tea Cup Inn for the women. This was followed by the trip through the oil fields.

Boy Causes Arrest of Alleged Swindler for Bilking Harvest Hands

That a number of men and boys have been swindled by one of the oldest of "skin games" is the belief of the police who are holding for further investigation a man who gives his name as John O'Brien and who was arrested late last night on complaint of Davy Smith a 14-year-old boy.

O'Brien's game was simple, in fact it was extremely crude, according to the story told the police by the boy. Since landing in Tulsa the "shell game" suspect posed as the owner of a large Missouri wheat farm and pretended to be hunting harvest hands, the boy said.

"All who accepted his offer of work on his wheat farm" gave O'Brien money for railroad tickets to Missouri. When I found out that I could not go and work for him I went to get my money back and he wouldn't give it up," the boy declared. Not only are the police convinced that the man never saw a wheat farm, but they believe that he has been responsible for a number of similar swindles that have been perpetrated here recently. A careful investigation of his career is to be made.

OPEN REFRESHMENT STAND

Community Kitchen Women to Sell Ice Cream and Cold Drinks.

Plans to operate refreshment stands in Owen and Central parks on July 5 to raise funds for the finishing and furnishing of the community kitchen at Boulder avenue and Archer street, were made at a meeting of the advisory board for the community kitchen from the Home Efficiency club. 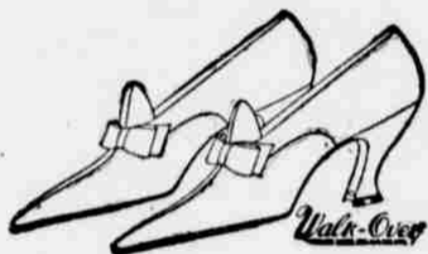

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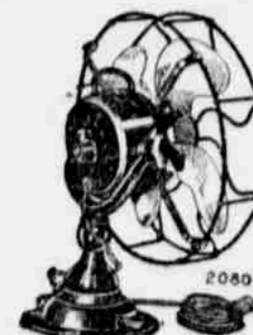

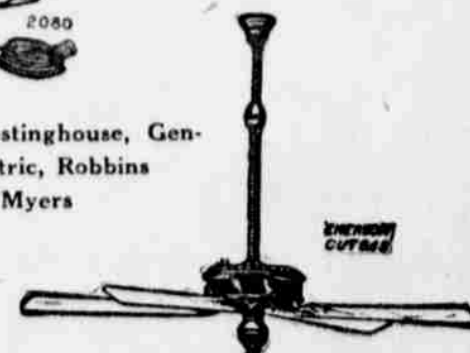
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
