

WIFE'S BULLET ENDS CAREER

Double Murder Followed by Unhappy Marital Life.

COVERED HIS UNIFORM

Acquitted by Court, But Curse of Blood Pursues Him to His Grave.

TAHLEQUAH, Okla., July 31.—Intelligence of the killing on Sunday evening of Homer Wilson by his wife, near Winfield, Kan., recalls not only one of the most spectacular and cold-blooded double murders committed in this section, but also the mysterious assassination of Charley West, the first husband of Mrs. Wilson.

In January, 1919, while William and Frank Anthony, father and son, were standing near the postoffice here reading a letter, Homer Wilson stepped out of the office of the Sequoyah theater, where it transpired he had been loitering the greater part of the day. He fired upon Frank Anthony, who fell fatally wounded, and an instant later the elder Anthony was shot down, falling across the body of his son. After the men were down Wilson continued to fire and literally filled their bodies with bullet holes. He was soon after arrested by a policeman. Wilson wore an overall suit, underneath which he did not wish to disgrace the uniform of the United States, hence the outer covering of the uniform was removed for killing the Anthonys was that they, as he stated, had been instrumental in breaking up his home, that his wife had confessed to intimacy with Frank Anthony. At his trial in March of 1919, a good deal of mawkish sentimentality was evidenced on behalf of some of the attendants at the trial, and although the prosecution was ably conducted, the verdict of the jury acquitted Wilson on one of the murder charges. He was never tried on the other. The evidence would have been practically the same and a verdict of acquittal would probably have been returned. Wilson left Tahlequah the same day he was acquitted and in a short time it was learned that his wife had joined him at Winfield. In time of the trial the defendant, in tears, stated that he loved his wife

to infatuation, but, according to the dispatch announcing the killing, it appears that the couple disagreed as to which should drive the automobile in which they were riding and that Mrs. Wilson soon crossed a revolver to Wilson's side, fired, and ended his career. Wilson had been a member of a wild west show and spent some time at Camp Funston, Kan. It was while there that he first ascertained, so he stated, that his wife was untrue to him.

In July, 1915, Charley West, a member of the board of county commissioners for Cherokee county, was shot a few hundred yards from his home in the north part of Tahlequah. West rarely left home after dark, being afraid, it has been said, of enemies. He, however, with his wife, walked to a spring on the evening he was shot. Returning the couple reached a foot-bridge across a gully and West, just in front of his wife, stepped upon the bridge when a shot from the rear brought him to the ground. He was carried to his home and died at noon the following day. Despite all efforts to ascertain who the assassin was no one was ever brought to trial for the crime. At the time of the murder of the Anthonys, though, it was rumored that one of them had doubtless fired the fatal shot, but there were many citizens who thought otherwise. West was a man of considerable wealth and was said to have had a large bank account as well as owning many cattle and other live stock. He also owned extensive farms and pasture land, and only a day or so prior to his fatal wounding is said to have been induced by his wife to make a will in her favor.

Homer Wilson, the second husband, was a tall and athletic man of fine physique. At his trial he appeared in the full uniform of a lieutenant and was the recipient each day of flowers from some of his admirers. He was noted as one of the most expert horsemen in the southwest.

Mrs. Wilson was practically reared in Tahlequah. Previous to her first marriage she was Grace Yeargin, daughter of S. P. Yeargin, a stock raiser and farmer who has lived in this section for many years. She is now the owner of much land and livestock in Cherokee county.

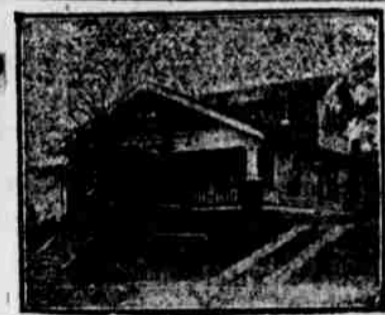
