Committee Plans Program for Summer Outing at Parthenia Park.

CAMP LODGE POPULAR

Week-End Trips to Summer Resort of Y. W. C. A. to End May 30.

Further plans for the high school girls' conference for Oklahoma and northern Texas to be held at the Y. W. C. A. camp at Parthenia park June 8-18, will be made at a joint conference of the organization committee, of which Mrs. C. C. Simmons is chairman, the girls' work committee, of which Mrs. C. E. Strouyelle is chairman, and the camp grounds committee, of which Mrs. Dan J. Davison is chairman, at 2 o'clock this afternoon in the association building.

The quota of delegates from the Tulsa high school Y. W. C. A. to the conference will be 20, the largest number permitted from any student association. These delegates will be selected by the high school and will remain at the camp during the entire conference. Other high school girls may also attend day programs and events at the camp, returning to Tulsa in the evening. The camp program will be ready for publication shortly.

The appointment of Miss Anna Kennedy as camp manager for the summer was announced yesterday by Miss Edna Ely, general secretary. Miss Kennedy, who is a sister of Mrs. G. E. Bennett of this city, will direct all buying for the camp and the general household care. A man and wife will be employed to cook.

Booklets giving the summer schedule for the camp will be ready this week. Miss Velada Hoebel, recreation secretary, who has charge of all camp recreation activities, said yesterday. The booklets will describe the kind of clothing and equipment most suitable for trips to the camp and will give the charges.

Week-end trips to the camp are becoming more and more popular as spring advances into summer. The party of 43 which week-ended at the camp Saturday and Sunday, May 8 and 9, consisted of young

women of the Gypsy Oil company, grade school teachers and a group of younger employed girls. Girl reserves of Osage and Celia Clinton schools will go to the camp Friday afternoon, May 14, and some women of the Oklahoma Producing and Refining company will spend Saturday evening and Sunday at the camp. The 50 members of the Halliburton Abbot club have voted to make their next semi-monthly meeting a picnic on the camp grounds. They will charter a special car and leave for the camp as quickly as possible after 5:30 o'clock Tuesday evening, May 18. Groups can arrange for week-end trips to Friendship Lodge until May 18. The lodge will be occupied exclusively by conference delegates from June 8 to 18. Grade school girls will have right of way at the camp from June 18 to July 12. After the middle of July the camp will be turned over to business women for periods of one week, two weeks or week-ends. Miss Hoebel requested yesterday that business women and girls of Tulsa register as far ahead as possible for trips to the camp, as a number of requests for use of the camp have been received from nearby cities and the association wishes to care for local groups first.

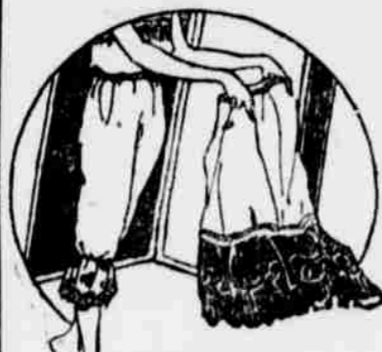
