Seniors to Receive Their Diplomas in Caps and Gowns.

PROGRAM ELABORATE

Grand Finale of Commencement of High Occurs at Convention Hall.

More than 170 students will receive diplomas at the commencement exercises at 8 o'clock Friday night at convention hall. The diplomas are printed on parchment paper and are inserted in a sheepskin cover bearing the name of the student and the high school seal in gold letters. The class roll is also printed on the diploma. They are given to high school students by Marie C. Prunty, principal yesterday.

A very elaborate and imposing program has been prepared for the occasion, which, according to Mr. Prunty, has been the goal of every boy and girl of the class from the time they set foot in a school building. The seniors will occupy stage seats and wear caps and gowns.

The program follows: America, by audience; invocation, Rev. C. W. Kerr; On Wings of Song, Mendelssohn club and high school girls; ceremonial presentation of diplomas, for high school, Marie C. Prunty; for city schools, E. E. Oberholzer; for board of education, H. O. McClure; The Star Spangled Banner, audience, standing.

This program and event closes the commencement week and the school year.

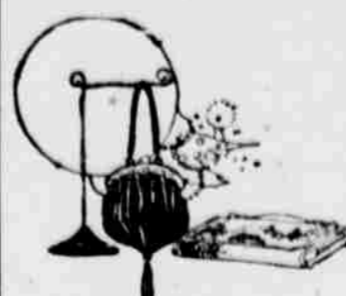

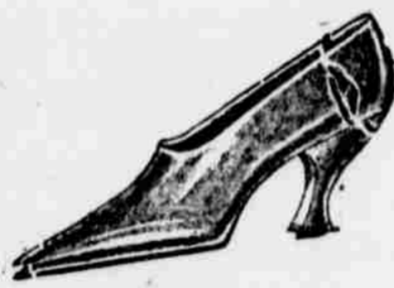
