

"BOND BROKERS" ARE ROUNDED UP

Nearly 100 Accomplices Caught by the Federal Sleuths in Raid.

WAR STAMPS SEIZED

Liberty Bonds, Recorded as Stolen Are Traced and Seized by U. S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—In the country wide roundup of "bond brokers" today, nearly 100 accomplices were caught by the federal sleuths in raid.

Secret service chief John Mullan, assisted by an army of sleuths, reviewing the result of the raid today, felt convinced that the drug net had caught the ring leaders in a gigantic scheme, with many ramifications that would have served to defeat the treasury's drive to benefit legitimate investors.

Chief among the offenders are alleged "brokers" who are styled as "freezers" by treasury experts through whom vast quantities of war savings stamps have been unloaded and through which channel large amounts of liberty bonds, previously recorded as stolen, have been traced.

Federal Taxes in 1921 Will Approximate \$550 for Each Family in U.S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Government taxes during 1921, will amount to approximately \$550 for every family in the United States, Representative Lane, republican, Massachusetts, declared today in the House, criticizing the federal reserve board for issuing \$3,900,000,000 in notes, Mr. Lane said there was an impending "financial menace".

The federal reserve system, he said, has "never stood any test." Representative Haffin, democrat, Alabama, replied that the reserve act was "the best piece of legislation developed to break the Wall street monopoly."

NEW IS DENIED 2ND TRIAL

Must Serve Not Less Than 10 Years and May Be Held for Life.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Jan. 29.—Harry A. New, convicted here in 1917 of murder in the second degree for shooting Miss Freda Lesser, was denied a new trial today. He was immediately sentenced to serve not less than 10 years, with a maximum of life imprisonment at San Quentin prison.

New drove to the police station here on the morning of July 3 last, bringing the body of Miss Lesser in an automobile. New signed confessions admitting that he killed her, and claiming he did so because she refused to marry him, although she was to become the mother of his child.

Intimation that an appeal would be taken was given by New's attorney who asked and secured a stay of execution of the sentence until next Tuesday.

DISPENSE LIQUOR BY PERMIT PLAN

Internal Revenue Department Announces the Plan to Procure It.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—Methods by which intoxicating liquors may be obtained for medicinal purposes and detailed regulations governing their sale were made public tonight by the bureau of internal revenue. Announcement also was made that the bureau had compiled a system of permits providing a definite and fixed channel through which all intoxicating liquors must move and by which hereafter the government will know the location of every gallon of distilled liquor within the nation's boundaries, except stored in private homes.

In setting forth the ways in which liquor may be procured, Commissioner Hoper took occasion to issue a warning against profiteering in its sale. The commissioner declared that prohibiting charges for liquor for medicinal purposes "in certain places dispensers thereof in the class with profiteers and they will be investigated." Mr. Hoper also announced that liquor seized under federal law prior to last October 23, unless claimed under the 60 days' ruling will be sold by order of the court under the jurisdiction of which it is held. 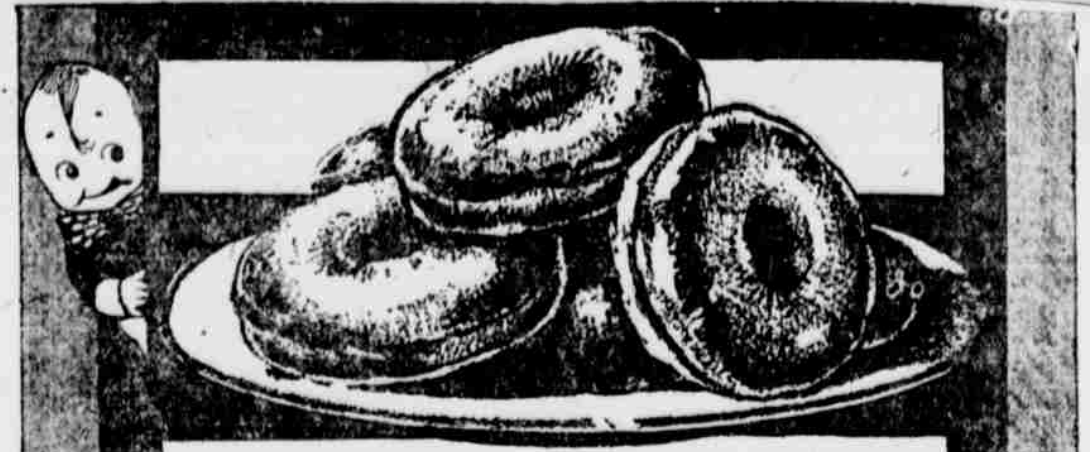
