

# Morvich, Block's Wonder Horse, Wins Kentucky Turt Classic by Two Lengths

## FAVORITE TAKES EARLY LEAD AND IS NEVER HEADED

### Bet Mose Comes Across Tape Ahead of John Finn by a Head

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 12.—Morvich, unconquered as a 2-year-old, is the winner of the \$50,000 Kentucky derby.

The brown son of Runnymede-Hymn, running true to form, won the event at a mile and a quarter, in a field of 10 starters today before a record-breaking throng of 70,000 spectators, the largest crowd that ever witnessed the running of the blue ribbon event for 3-year-olds.

Morvich paid the surprisingly good odds of 14 to 1 to win in the subterfuge, \$4,400 and \$3.30 for a \$2 ticket. The mutual price on Bet Mose was \$2.90 and \$2.70 and \$1.60 on John Finn.

Spending into the lead just after the start, Morvich made every pace a winning post and he apparently never was in danger.

He accepted every challenge from the field trying to defeat him. The colt was admirably ridden by Albert Johnson and carried 124 pounds.

My Play, a full brother to Man-o-War, staggered into fifth place, with Letterman pulling up in sixth position. Star the star of the year and far back was Startle, the great juvenile filly of 1921, with By Gosh eighth.

Busy American, another Bradley entry, did not finish. The injured leg of the star colt called to withstand the strain. The colt broke down rounding the first turn and was pulled up as the flying field sped on in quest of the premier honors of the turf.

My Play Off First. Joekey Robinson, riding My Play, shot into the lead as the barrier was sprung. Behind him, thirty-four riders with the pace and watching the two leaders, fifty feet from the start.

Morvich, running with marvelous pace, made the turn into the stretch without losing a foot and straightened away for the goal. He was a head ahead of John Finn when the race was over.

Morvich, old boy, you're eating the ground, hold it all this way. Block was still shouting when a crowd of admirers seized and carried him through the thousands of persons packed in front of the stand.

HUTCHINSON, Kan., May 13.—Barney Cleveland's Sapulpa Yankees made it three in a row here today, taking the third of the series 7 to 3 in an extra inning affair and in which Sapulpa contended the murderous hitting that has been a feature of their first road trip.

In the tenth the visitors put over another and scored. Barney Cleveland's triple accounted for Sapulpa's scores in the ninth and Captain Decker's home run in the same period tied the game.

Miller, Yank first baseman, fattened his batting average and obtained his third circuit smash in the Hutchinson series when he eased the horseshoe over the fence in the fifth with bases empty.

Salina Is Smothered. SALINA, Kan., May 13.—Bartlesville had little trouble today in defeating Salina 10 to 3. Salina scored twice off four singles in the opening inning and led in the fifth, but Bartlesville recovered after the first and pitched good ball. He cleared the bases in the fifth with a triple.

D. C. Bothwell is playing a consistent game around the 76 mark. A dozen ladies were out on the course yesterday. Among the players were Mrs. E. R. Perry, Mrs. Winston Henry, Mrs. H. B. Henry of Chicago, and Mrs. George Hanson, chairman of the ladies' tournaments last year.

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The introduction of the stymie on the links has been somewhat of an innovation to the golfers here, about as it has never been used in tournaments.

Although the decree has not been received at the local club, it is certain to be taken up here when the Western takes action. Many of the leading golfers and amateurs will take up the study of the stymie and the art of lifting one ball over the other with a niblick.

Many of the leading golfers welcome the stymie back after its absence of two seasons, and declare it is one of the prettiest shots of the green.

## THIRTY-TWO CARS ENTERED IN RACE AT INDIANAPOLIS

Three Nations Are to Be Represented in 500-Mile Classic

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 13.—Thirty-two cars have been entered in the tenth annual 500-mile international sweepstakes automobile race to be run at the Indianapolis motor speedway on May 20, it was announced today by T. E. Meyers, secretary and general manager of the speedway. The purse offered is \$50,000, with added money bringing it to \$100,000, it was said.

Entries closed last Monday night, but announcement of the official list nominated for the event was withheld until today. Included in the list of drivers are Tommy Milton, 1921 A. A. A. champion; Howard Wilcox, Ralph De Palma and Jules Goux, all former winners of the local event. Jimmy Murphy, winner of the 1921 French Grand Prix; Wallace Reid, motion picture star; and E. C. Cannonball, famous transcontinental motorcycle and automobile driver, are others who have entered. Baker, however, suffered injuries in California yesterday, shortly after starting a motorcycle dash across the country, which may keep him out of the local contest, according to reports.

American, French and English built cars will try to qualify to start in the contest. Louis Chevrolet, designer of the winners in 1920 and 1921, has named several machines to compete again this year.
