M. L. Turner of Oklahoma City Pays  
1,036-10 for Them.

Mayor Dick and C. L. Byrne re-  
turned from Oklahoma City this morn-  
ing, where they had been to confer  
with different people who wanted to  
buy Ardmore's waterworks and  
school bonds.

At the conclusion of the day's work  
they concluded to accept M. L. Turn-  
er's bid of \$6,316 for the \$175,000,  
making \$181,316 the city gets for the  
bonds, which is \$1,036-10.

ing will be held this afternoon for the  
purpose of ratifying this action.
