## ONE MILLION FEET OF LUMBER.

Part of it Here Now to Build Railroad Bridges.

Work will be pushed from this time on, on the bridge work of the C. O. & G. and A. & C. roads for fifteen miles out. Contractor Sullivan has the work in charge and will build all the bridges for both roads for about fifteen miles east, or to the point where the roads separate.

One million feet of lumber has been ordered for the occasion and the first consignment of it has already arrived.

The steam and horse-power pile driver is looked for every day and the work of driving them in the ground will commence at once. The piles necessary to support the trains of the two roads across this chasm, laid end to end, would measure 11,850 feet.
