Of these, twenty-eight made affidavit that they owed no more than the law allowed them, thus preventing attachments. Then under the decision of the Supreme Court they were arrested for petit larceny and bonded over in the sum \$3.00 each. All but six gave bond. The postal laws make it petit larceny to take a paper and refuse to pay for it.
