A large number of Choctaws arrived in Chickasha last week to look the surrounding country over for allotments. Some of them went to Minco, where the unallotted land is more plentiful. Most of the land in the vicinity of Chickasha and Minco has been allotted to Mississippi Choctaws or full bloods. With few exceptions they are accompanied by white men, who select their allotments and attend to all the red tape and legal business attendant on securing claims. They do not expect to locate on them permanently and they will all leave them as soon as possible. The government requires that they shall have seen the land they wish as allotments.

**SURRENDERS ON A DREAM.**

**Negro Freedmen Held for Grand Jury in Assault Case.**  
Muskogee, I. T., July 15.—Jerry McIntosh, the negro freedman, who is charged with saturating his wife's clothing with kerosene and then setting fire to them, came to this city today and surrendered to Bass Reeves, deputy United States marshal. McIntosh says he dreamed last night that Deputy Marshal Reeves came upon him in the brush and when he jumped up to run the deputy shot and killed him.

When he awoke and realized that it was only a dream he decided to come to town and give up immediately. He was arraigned before the United States commissioner today on the charge of assaulting his wife with intent to kill. After pleading guilty, he was bound over to the grand jury and was sent to jail in default of \$10,000 bond.

**DISSATISFACTION IN TERRITORY.**

**Secretary of Interior's Rules on Sale of Lands the Cause.**  
Muskogee, I. T., July 15.—A movement has been started in the Indian Territory to get the ear of President Roosevelt and protest against the policy of Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock in the sale of Indian lands. Delegations were here yesterday from Wagoner and Tulsa to see what could be done.

The cause of the dissatisfaction is the new set of rules and regulations issued by the secretary for the sale of lands.

**British Islands Seized.**

London, July 15.—According to the Press Association a peculiar rumor was afloat in the lobby of the House of Commons tonight to the effect that some United States warship had seized, off the coast of Boreno, twenty small islands, which, it is said, belong to Great Britain, and had planted the American flag on them.

It is probable that a question on the subject will be asked in the house.

**Five Thousand Lives Lost.**

Paris, July 15.—Details have just been received here of a typhoon which has swept over a large portion of Tonquin, the French possession in Southern China, which is said to have been one of the most disastrous ever known there. Hanoi, the capital of Tonquin, was devastated and Nandinh was literally swept out of existence. Scarcely a house is left standing for miles. A barrel of spirits was found 129 miles from the scene of the disaster. All the natives who were caught in the typhoon perished, and it is estimated that the loss of life is between 2,000 and 5,000.
