

### KLANSMEN ENTER MISSOURI ARENA

#### Empire Becomes Factor in Politics Following K. C. Konklave

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Oct. 11.—Klansmen of the Ku Klux Klan threw themselves into the political arena in Missouri today following an open meeting of the organization in that state last night in which 25,000 persons were admitted while several thousand others fought in vain to gain entrance.

The klansmen urged that only prominent Americans be voted for at the coming election and that party lines be cast aside for that purpose.

Some of the klansmen appeared in uniform and declarations of the leader of their affiliation with the Klan met with demonstrations from the crowd.

The Ku Klux Klan in Missouri is four hundred stronger today as a result of initiation ceremonies immediately preceding the open meeting, Senator James A. Reed was denounced and his defeat urged.

Youth Convicted of Murder.

ST. JOHNS, Kans., Oct. 11.—After deliberations which lasted throughout the night, a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree was returned by a jury in the county district court here today against Jean Howard, 17.

The youngster killed W. S. Fletcher, a harvest hand, in June, following an altercation.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Fear that 14-year-old Margaret Davis, pretty high school girl, who ran away from her home a day ago, has been murdered, was expressed by the police today when they located her father's car which the girl had taken. Near the car when it was located was a man who fled at the approach of the policeman.

### BALLARD CASE CONTINUED

Trial of Woman Charged With Auto Theft Up Next Week.

Bernice Ballard, Adolphus Batters, Joe Wilson and Jack Bailey, charged with auto theft, whose preliminary trial was scheduled to be heard yesterday before Justice A. P. Watson, have at least another week ahead of them behind the bars of the Tulsa county jail. All due to the failure of one of the state's important witnesses to put in his appearance at the trial Wednesday morning. The four prisoners are accused of the theft of a car from Frank Hunter and Clarence Cameron. The state was granted a continuance of one week yesterday by Justice Watson.

Another continuance was in the case of H. E. Tapp, who is charged with larceny. Failure of witnesses to appear also caused this continuance. Tapp's bond was first forfeited by Justice Watson when the defendant failed to appear in court but the forfeiture was later set aside upon Tapp's appearance.

Dwight Welch and Paul Wilkerson, two youths, who were charged with the theft of airplane parts from the Curtis field, were dismissed by Justice Watson after the state had rested the case. The justice said that the
