### A KIND ACT.

A Chapter of United States Court in Indian Territory.

Last winter A. F. Thomason from the Western part of the district, was tried and convicted at Okmulgee for an assault with intent to kill. It seemed that he and another claimed the same tract of land. Both were determined, and both carried their Winchester about their fields for use in emergencies. They finally came together and both began shooting about the same time. Thomason was unhurt but his opponent received a wound in the leg and had Thomason arrested. There was a trial in the U. S. court.

As soon as the jury found Thomason guilty, he asked Judge Raymond for a little private talk with him. He was granted, and with tears in his eyes Thomason explained that he was about to have a babe at his home, an although found guilty, and must go at once to jail, he asked to go to his wife and return for service in the Federal jail as soon as his baby arrived.

His request appealed to the Judge, and he was granted 30 days visit at home before serving his time, on condition he give a bond for his return. This he said he could easily obtain, and said he would go now to jail for a day or two until his friends returned with the bond. The bond came in a day or two, and Thomason was told to go to his wife.

There happened to be a case of small pox in the jail at the time, and Thomason became infected with the disease before going home, but did not know it. His babe was born and in a few days father, mother, babe and family were down with the small-pox. In 30 days he wrote the Judge his situation, and in reply was told to never mind his bond but to stay with his family and come to court when all had recovered. This he promised to do. About corn planting time Thomason, his word as good as his bond, came to the Judge and, with tears in his frank face, told the Judge of the death of his baby from the horrid disease and offered to go to jail to pay the penalty for his violation of the law. The Judge told him to go and plant his crop, look after his family, and I will trust you to come back and surrender when you have made

provision for your wife and little ones.

Thomason went home, put his crop in the ground, and again reported to the Judge as ready to serve his time. The Judge looked him in the eyes and said, "Thomason, you must be a good man or you would never have returned and requested me to send you to jail. You have suffered enough at home to your good wife, and promise me never again to violate the laws of the United States."

Thomason reached out his hand. The Judge clasped it. No word was spoken. But the Judge knew what his man meant. It was humane judgment, even if the law books give no precedent, and its influence for good will be broader than a sentence in the federal jail.—Sapulpa Light.

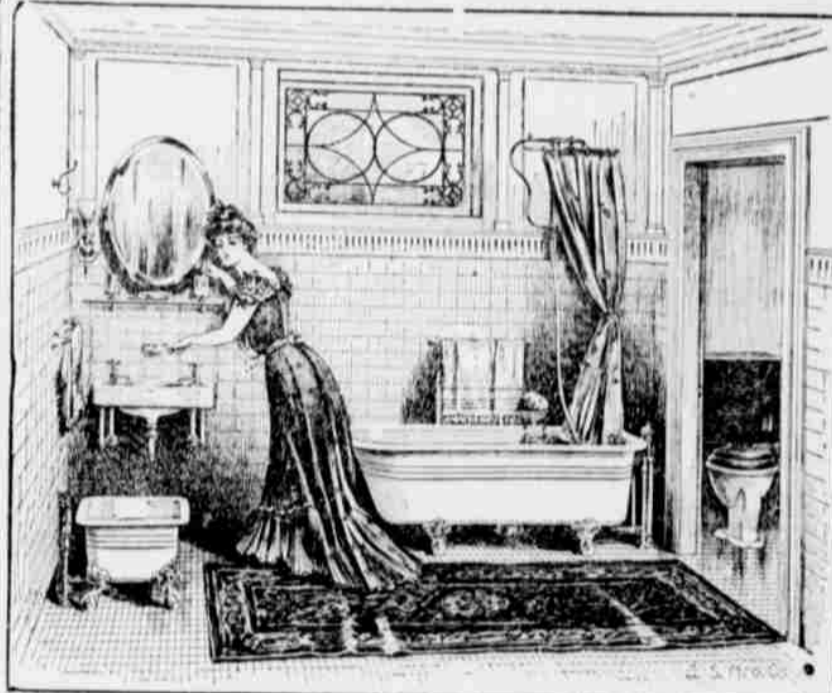
