DELAYED NEWS

OF STORM IN KIAMICHI VALLEY. SIX LIVES LOST.

All Communication Cut Off—Talihina Had No Rail or Wire Connection With Outside World for Five Days—Talihina Escaped.

Talihina, I. T., June 9.—A cloudburst over the Kiamichi valley June 4 and farms were damaged. All fences were washed away.

There has been no communication with the outside world for the last five days. Miles of railroad are off the dump and bridges are gone north and south.

Tony Jones lost five children drowned. He saved himself, wife and one child by climbing trees over night.

Deputy Marshal Ben Lock narrowly escaped death in rescuing a family of ten, putting them in trees, where they stayed for five hours.

No material damage was done to the town of Talihina. One child was drowned at Bengal.
