

A GREATER ARDMORE

THE MIGHTY FORCE OF THE HAMMER AND SAW.

How the Town is Growing in the Residential Districts—The Cheap Home of the Pioneer Days Giving Away to Palatial Residences.

In order to give anything like a complete list of the recently constructed residential homes and dwellings now under course of construction it would be necessary to devote a day or two to driving over the city for the compilation of such items. After considerable inspection along this line the Ardmoreite is able to give the following notes of improvement in residence districts of our fast growing city.

Kenneth Hudson's new home, corner B street and 2nd Avenue, northwest, is nearing completion and when finished will be one of the neatest cottages in the city. This house will cost a little more than \$2,500 and is constructed strictly on the bungalow style. It is one story with basement heating plant and rooms in the attic. The entire interior will be plastered and papered, and the bath, pantry and kitchen will have enameled imitation tile finish. The floors are to be hard maple and oak. There are seven rooms and eight closets. The rooms are fitted with stationary mirrors. The chimneys are made of round cut stone, the fireplaces are of tile and there are three ornamental mantles. A convenient latticed porch is at the rear and a very attractive built-in verandah is entered by wide stone steps at the front.

C. T. Barengeer, present owner of the Arihan James old place, 1018 D street, southeast, has remodeled his residence, making it one of the handsomest homes in that portion of town. It is two-story frame on artificial stone foundation. There are twelve large rooms connected by spacious hallways and suitably arranged closets and bath.

W. L. Green of Marietta is having two neat cottages erected on the line of a street to be opened up between D and H streets southeast. This will be known as Masters street, and several buildings are in prospect along this way as soon as it is opened up.

J. D. Halsey's residence on 5th Avenue southeast is undergoing important improvement. This house is between C street and the Santa Fe railway.

Dr. J. P. Fann is building a new residence in the McFlish addition on the corner of 1st Avenue and Eller street. This house is built on the bungalow style and will be a neat home when completed. There are five rooms, a reception hall, bath and closets. It fronts north.

A handsome home is being erected on West Main street for J. S. B. Apollon. This is to be about a seven-room house, and is now almost complete. It is located opposite Dr. Booth's home.

A neat tenant house has just been completed by Bob Lee on his West Main street property near Billie Roberts' home.

A two-room addition is made by W. E. Taltalferro to his tenant house, 618 North Washington street.

Charles Stewart has purchased a house on 6th Avenue Northwest, between Washington and A streets and is having it remodeled into a neat residence.

Contractor M. H. Jordan has a neat new five-room residence on 6th Avenue, northwest, between G and H streets.

C. Bagby has bought a neat cottage on 6th Avenue. This part of town is coming to the front as a residence property.

A \$2,000 home is being erected by S. S. Cole at the corner of D street and 5th Avenue, northwest. This house will have a southeast corner location on one of the best blocks in the city, and is within an improvement district, which insures a beautiful street and concrete sidewalks all the way to Main. The building is one story with rooms in the attic. There are seven rooms with closets and bath and a long run of porch both front and rear adds to the comfort and completes the beauty of finish.

Rev. W. R. Selvidge has just moved into his new home on 6th Avenue, between B and C streets, northwest. This is a neat seven-room cottage fronting the north. There is a shapely veranda in front a conveniently arranged reception hall and a spacious screened-in porch at the rear of the house.

D. W. Duke is making an addition of

several rooms to his 6th Avenue home. G. W. Stuart's new residence, corner A street and 8th Avenue, northwest, is now nearing completion. This house is a neat frame-built on foundation of red pressed brick. There are six large rooms and a bath. Round columns support the well-shaped roof of the front porch.

The home of L. L. Tyson, corner H street and 5th Avenue, northwest, is undergoing a complete remodeling. The house has been enlarged into a story and a half building making five large rooms, two spacious hallways and porch encircling the entire two sides of frontage. This occupies a southwest corner position on the block, it painted white and has a very pretty roof effect.

Mrs. D. W. Conway is now a resident of 11th Avenue, northwest, where she has erected a neat cottage.

Tom Nolan is having a five-room cottage erected between Washington and Caddo on 5th Avenue Northwest.

J. W. McFarlane has built a neat five-room home on North Washington street, where he now resides.

Fifteen hundred and fifteen is the number on a North Caddo residence, where considerable improvement has been made.

Work on the Second ward and Fourth ward school buildings is progressing nicely. The Second ward building occupies the block between 5th and 6th Avenues and G and H streets Northeast. The main entrance will front west. The building is being constructed of red pressed brick with white stone trimmings. The Fourth ward building is a duplicate of the Second ward structure. This building is located at the corner of Carter street and 4th Avenue Southwest. These two buildings will cost in the neighborhood of \$31,000.

E. J. Cox is building an addition to his residence, 705-H street Northwest.

W. S. Easley's new home on G street Northwest is nearing completion. This is one of the neatest dwellings in that portion of the city. It has a west front.

H. T. Hunt, a relative of the Eralys and of Dr. Peterman, is among the new residents of Ardmore. They come from Marshall, Texas, and their home is a neat drab and white cottage on 3rd Avenue Northeast.

D. N. Ferguson is building a 28 by 32 five-room house on his tenant property on Broadway Northeast.

Wm. T. Simpson, 915 Broadway Northeast, is making a neat addition of several rooms to his home.

C. E. Easley has recently completed a neat tenant house at 814 Broadway Northeast.

The residence of Dr. Hargrave, corner E and Carter streets Southeast, is being remodeled and repaired.

T. E. Roland is having additions made to the extent of two rooms, a hall and long porch, at his home, 717 5th Avenue Southeast.

P. P. Haas, 699 G street Southeast, has just finished remodeling his home to the extent of several added rooms.

There are three or four neat new tenant houses with continuous concrete walks in front just completed in the 300 block on A street Southwest.

The new residence of Judge William Pfeiffer in the McFlish addition is now well under way. This is a two-story building and will be an ornament to that portion of the city when finished. It will be a house of about fifteen rooms and is being constructed in elegant style.

Mayor R. W. Diek has just completed a five-room addition to his West Main street home. The style of the house has been changed into a two-story structure, making in all nine rooms.

The finishing and furnishing of the L. N. Turman residence on the corner of 2nd Avenue and B street, southwest, completes one of the prettiest homes in the city. Ornamental coping and concrete sidewalks skirt the entire east and south side of the entire large yard and lead up to the front of the house, which is two stories, with wide porch to the east. There are ten large rooms and two hallways. The front entrance is a high plate glass door set in lattice side-lights and transom. The reception hall and sitting room are finished in golden oak with red burlap wainscoting, golden oak mold and crimson crushed velvet lower third. The entrance from the hall into the sitting room is by a handsome grille and colonnade. The furniture here is of Spanish leather finish. A handsome panel decorated stairway of golden oak leads up from the lower hall and at the rear, underneath this, is a tiled lavatory.

West of the sitting room is the library, furnished and finished in the finest birds eye maple. The drawing room is finished in snow white, trimmed with gold mold. The furniture is gold leaf, Louis XV style, which includes a pure onyx-topped table, the floor is of hardwood and the center rug is imported gobelin. The dining room is finished in green and gold with arbor frieze and golden oak plate-

rail ornamented with steins, plaques and bric-a-brac. The furniture in here is elegant. The table is sixty inches, round and of golden oak, the sideboard is seven feet in width with a six-inch mirror, nonpareil art, hand-carved. There are two beautiful cabinets for the china and cut glass. The china is imported French Havellin, included in which is a chintz set made at Nagoya, Japan. Opening from the dining room is a revolving door, which is the entrance to the buttery-pantry and the kitchen. These and the bath rooms have tile finish and rubber linoleum. The bedrooms are in the upper story and all are equipped by a spacious hall. An open porch is at the front of the upper hall and porch-screened porch is at the rear. The interior ceilings are all high and the golden oak finish is carried throughout.
