INDIAN GIVES VIEWS EXPRESSED HIS VIEWS

CHAS. D. CARTER TALKS ON THIS LIVE TOPIC.

Suggests Proper Restrictions Be Placed on Management of Full Blood Holdings—Favors Sale of Coal Lands.

Chas. D. Carter, a prominent Indian citizen, and a possible candidate of the democratic party for congress was seen this morning and asked as to his views on the question of the hour, that of the removal of restrictions.

Mr. Carter is perhaps in the best position to know what the needs of this section are, as he is well posted on Indian affairs and knows the limitations of the Indian. He said:

"I think that the business interests of this community and the welfare of the Indian demand that the restrictions of all half breeds, be removed, i. e. upon all allotments except homesteads of the intermarried citizens.

"As to full blood Indians, there are many of them who are not competent to manage their own affairs and I think it would be well enough to have some character of supervision over the sales of their lands, either by the department or state government. I think some plan could be arranged whereby the fullblood would be allowed to manage his landed interest as he sees fit, whenever he can show that he is competent to attend to these matters.

It should be arranged so that educated fullbloods and in fact all those competent to manage their affairs might have restrictions removed without too much red tape, placing the fullblood upon his own responsibility when it can be shown that he is sufficiently educated to take care of himself.

"Some arrangements should also be made to enable the full blood Indian to lease his land for a longer period than one year. The reason that many fullblood allotments are only partially improved and many of them haven't the necessary capital today for improvements. Allowing them to lease their lands, deals could be made with white farmers to improve their places for a lease of a term of years on the land.

"Relative to the coal lands, I think the department should provide for the sale of the surface of said lands at the earliest possible moment; and that some provision should be made for the sale of the coal on said land so that this product could eventually pass to the ownership of the state to be used for a permanent school fund. Having, of course, due consideration the rights of Indians paying them for such lands, and at the same time considering the rights of the lessees.

"I think that the trial authorities will not be unreasonable and if given ample time to present their views on these three subjects, that some equitable solution will result which will redound to the good of the new state."

D. H. LINEBAUGH, CANDIDATE FOR CONGRESS, TALKS.

On a Still Hunt Through the District for Votes—Favors Primary Plan. For the Making of Nominations.

D. H. Linebaugh of Atoka, a candidate for congress in this district, was in Ardmore Thursday afternoon and Friday morning. Mr. Linebaugh is a promising young attorney of this section as well as a rising politician. He also favors the primary plan of nomination, and in speaking of the plan said: "We promised it to the people and by all means they should have the primary so as to have the voice of the entire party as to who should be their leaders in both national and state affairs."

"Practically in all of the districts in the Indian Territory the Democratic candidates for the constitutional convention were selected by the primary and I think that the methods used was the most satisfactory, and should be used in the selection of candidates for all offices, both for congress and state."

When queried as to his opinion on the removal of restrictions he said: "I feel like this is one of the most important questions to be considered by our national congress, and I favor the immediate removal of all restrictions upon the alienation of all allotments of allottees, except upon the homestead of the Indians by birth. I also favor the sale of the unallotted land to actual settlers in tracts not exceeding 160 acres to any one purchaser.

"Now, as to the disposition of the coal lands, I favor the purchase by the federal government at fair and reasonable valuation of the segregated coal lands, and the donation of the same to the new state as a permanent school fund, with a provision of the immediate sale of the surface to actual settlers, in tracts not exceeding 160 acres, in this way I feel that we will not only be enabled to provide an ample system of free schools, and provide homes, but will be enabled to crush the coal trust that is now rearing its head in our midst.

"The sweeping victory of Democracy in our last election should make the heart of every Democrat glad, and by keeping faith with the people our party will grow strong and stronger in the new state."
