DOCTOR COOK TO ENTER SANITARIUM

AMERICAN EXPLORER WILL STAY INCOGNITO AT SANITARIUM NEAR HEIDELBERG.

HEALTH IS SERIOUSLY AFFECTED

As a Result of Events Following Unfavorable Recognition from Copenhagen Doctor Cook is in a Pitiable Condition.

Frankfort-on-the-Main, Germany, Jan. 18.—It is reported here that Doctor Frederick A. Cook has arranged for a strictly incognito stay at a sanitarium near Heidelberg.

The health of the explorer is reported seriously affected by the recent events.

No explanation of who made the arrangements is given, where Cook now is or when he will arrive at the sanitarium.

WALSH TO LEAVE FOR PEN TONIGHT

CHICAGO BANKER STARTS TO LEAVENWORTH, KANSAS TONIGHT TO BEGIN SENTENCE.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 18.—United States Marshal Hoy announced today that John R. Walsh will be taken to the federal prison at Leavenworth, Kansas, tonight.

Walsh will be taken from here on a train leaving at 6 o'clock this evening. According to present plans he will be accompanied by Marshal Hoy and Deputy Marshal Thomas Middleton.

AUTHORITIES AT KANSAS CITY WILL NOT TAKE INITIATIVE IN MAKING ARRESTS.

SWOPE INTERESTS TO DO IT

Another Conference Between Representatives of the Swope Estate and Experts at Chicago Held Today.

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 18.—Another conference between the representatives of the estate of the late Colonel Thomas Swope and Professor Walter S. Sains and Ludwig Nok ten, who are examining the stomachs of Colonel Swope and his nephew, Christmas Swope, will be held this afternoon.

Authorities Are Waiting. Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 18.—The local authorities who are working on the Swope case, are playing a waiting game.

Indications today were that if any arrests are made in the near future, it must be at the instigation of the Swope interests and that the prosecutor's office will not take the initiative.

CHANGE OF VENUE IN KIDNAPING CASE

COURT GRANTS CHANGE OF VENUE ON GROUNDS OF TOPEKA PEOPLE'S PREJUDICE.

Topeka, Kan., Jan. 18.—Judge Daul, in the district court today granted a change of venue in the incubator baby case.

The change of venue was granted on the ground that the people of Topeka and Shawnee county are prejudiced against the defendants.

Tegeler Case Appealed. Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 17.—The court of Criminal Appeals today heard arguments in the appeal of Rudolph Tegeler of Oklahoma City, under a life sentence for murder, and tomorrow will hear the presentation in the Dun Scribner case, from Ada.

SUIT IS BROUGHT AGAINST PACKERS

ARMOUR AND SWIFT PACKING COMPANY MADE DEFENDANTS IN CIVIL ACTION TODAY.

ARE MEMBERS OF COMBINATION

Attorney General of Kansas Alleges Two Packing Concerns Are Members of Kansas City Produce Exchange and Liable to Fine.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 18.—Attorney General Jackson today began suit before Judge True in the district court at Kansas City, Kansas, against the Armour and Swift Packing companies and their agents in Kansas.

The suit is brought under the Kansas law, providing a penalty of \$100 per day for corporation, which are members of a combination. It is alleged that the Armours and Swifts are members of the Kansas City Produce Exchange and therefore liable.

The suit is a civil one and the attorney general says it follows the indictments of the packers in Missouri on similar grounds.

Alleged Magazine Trust.

Washington, Jan. 18.—An alleged "magazine trust," which is declared to control the prices and distribution of a large number of popular publications, is now under investigation by the government.

The attention of the officials of the department of justice has been directed to the matter by the district attorney's office in Cleveland, O., and they have read the communication with a good deal of interest. The letter contains information furnished by W. H. Brett, public librarian of that city, who, it is said, was unable to obtain discounts on a large order for magazines, having been told that a periodical clearing house controlled prices.

THE HOUSE ACCEPTS CONFERENCE REPORT

WORST FLOOD IN WABASH'S HISTORY

LOWLANDS ALONG THE WABASH ARE FLOODED AND DAMAGE WILL BE VERY HEAVY.

INTERURBAN SERVICE STOPPED

Navigation Was Suspended on the Mississippi at Memphis Today as a Result of the Heavy Flides of Ice in the Stream.

Wabash, Ind., Jan. 18.—The Wabash river is facing one of the most destructive floods in its history and only the most favorable conditions will save the city from heavy damage.

All the lowlands along the Wabash river are inundated and service on the Fort Wayne and Wabash Valley traction line is expected to be discontinued this afternoon. The cars are running today through eight-foot inches of water west of here.

Navigation is Suspended.

Memphis, Tenn., Jan. 18.—Navigation was suspended on the Mississippi river at this point today, on account of heavy flides of ice, which are filling the river from bank to bank.

Not since 1905 has the ice been so heavy here.

MAKES NOVEL PROPOSITION.

Would Divide 4000 Acres Land Among the Unemployed.

St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 17.—In a speech in which he offered to give his holdings of 4000 acres of rich Arkansas land for division among the unemployed of the country, George M. Jackson, 75 years old, of Piggott, Ark., told the Brotherhood Welfare Association today that he would take his land away from his nine heirs and give it to the poorest of the people if other landowners could be induced to adopt like altruistic program.

"I am an old man not likely to live long, and I have the descendants who would in the natural course of events be made rich by the inheritance of my fortune, but my love for them is so great, and my fear that the land will be taken from them by the capitalists of the country, that I will be the first to voluntarily throw all my land into a common body which shall be distributed by the government among the whole people. If this is not done my children's children will be landless inside of a generation."

L. Easley of Sulphur is in the city on a brief visit. He says Sheriff Maxwell is confined to his bed and is very sick, but at his request his trial has proceeded. The prosecution has not yet uncovered anything wrong with his administration and a complete exoneration is expected.

MINE WORKERS ARE NOW IN CONVENTION

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONVENTION OF UNITED MINE WORKERS AT INDIANAPOLIS.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 18.—The annual convention of the United Mine Workers of North America, which opened here today will be practically devoted to the interests of the thousands of men who are working in the coal fields of the whole country. More than 1,000 delegates are expected.

Conference of Governors.

Washington, Jan. 18.—The opening gun in the congressional campaign for general interstate commerce legislation was fired today, when the house committee on interstate and foreign commerce held its first meeting. Plans were made to continue the hearings daily until all the desired facts have been obtained.

Chairman Mann has announced that all bills amendatory of, supplementary to affecting the act to regulate commerce, or affecting the facilities for transportation, or regulations, and practices regarding transportation, will be given a full hearing by the committee.

LOOKS LIKE THEY'LL GET STATEHOOD, TOO

HOUSES PASSES BILL FOR SEPARATE STATEHOOD FOR ARIZONA AND NEW MEXICO.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 18.—The bill admitting Arizona and New Mexico was passed by the house yesterday afternoon without opposition, this being the most striking feature of the debate. Friends of the measure are confident of its passage by the senate. The bill provides the limitations that are to prevail in the power of the states to legislate, restricting the sale or liquor among the Indians and providing methods of state organization.

Eastern Star Charter.

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 17.—A charter was issued today for the consolidated Order of the Eastern Star of Oklahoma, which includes the former jurisdictions of both territories. The trustees are A. F. Martin of Marlow, John G. Lindsay of Norman and Kittle Lee McClain of Stillwater.

PENNSYLVANIA TOWN HAS A BAD BLAZE

OPERA HOUSE, NEWSPAPER OFFICE AND SEVERAL STORES DESTROYED AT ASHLAND.

Ashland, Penn., Jan. 18.—The Ashland opera house was destroyed by fire, the office of the Ashland Telegram was practically ruined and the stocks of several business places damaged by flames early today. The loss is estimated at \$80,000.

For Monument at Gettysburg.

Richmond, Va., Jan. 18.—The Gettysburg Monument Commission's competition for models and designs for the proposed monument to Virginia troops will close today. Several prominent artists have submitted designs. The memorial is to be placed in what is known as Spangler Woods, the point from which Gen. Lee observed the memorable charge up Cemetery Ridge. The commission expects to spend about \$50,000 on the project.

Cul. Thomas Smith, secretary of the commission, made the following announcement in regard to the monument:

"It is the determination of the Virginia commission that this memorial shall be a record of all the Virginia troops engaged in the battle at Gettysburg and it is desired that the design shall be of a form to accomplish this paramount purpose. The commission plans for a monument surmounted by an equestrian figure of General Robert E. Lee, but will consider plans without such equestrian figure, but effective in achieving the object of the intended tribute.
