## REPUBLICAN STATE COMMITTEE

Postmasters Were Controlling Element of This G. O. P. Caucus and When in Doubt Fell Back on their Friend, the Federal Court.

Guthrie, Jan. 17.—The republican state committee met at the Hotel in Guthrie today and to all intents and purposes represented the postmasters of the state. The Payne-Alfitch bill, the Tar administration, the republican con-

gressmen from Oklahoma, were all mixed up together in one endorsement and the whole nomenclature of the members without the least show of merry on the part of the postmasters. The insurgent sentiment was led by such men as Henry Brundage, Omar Bonedict and Ed Perry, and outside of the committee represented a majority of the crowd that attended the meeting. Inside the committee, however, the administration through the postmasters of the state had done some wonderful work in organization. Whenever a congressman showed any signs of independent thought or action he was unceremoniously set upon by the machine. The insurgents realized that it would be impossible to defeat the election of Jim Harris and sought to make a harmony plea by supporting him and in return to have no resolutions passed endorsing the hated Payne-Alfitch bill or the three republican congressmen from Oklahoma. The postmasters accepted with much gratitude the votes for Harris but could not see their way clear to allow independent

thought and action to have a place in their proceedings. The postmaster crowd had previously prepared a set of resolutions endorsing the Tar administration and Tar's declaration that the Payne-Alfitch bill was the best tariff bill ever passed, also endorsing the motion of Bird McGuire, Dick Morgan and C. E. Creeger. Of course the resolutions condemned the democratic state administration. The insurgent element under the leadership of Senator Stanford of Oklahoma, offered an amendment which eliminated the most nauseating part of the resolutions, to wit: The endorsement of the republican congressmen. The debate which followed the offering of the amendment was of such character that asbestos coats would have been a genuine comfort. After both sides had exhausted the strongest words contained in Webster's dictionary, a motion to table the amendment was made, and upon roll call, developed a vote of 12 for tabling the amendment to 24 against. For a few moments after the announcement of the vote the most blood curdling and ear splitting noises came from all corners of the room. "Postmasters! Postmasters!" yelled the insurgents. "Postmasters' machine!" was reverberated and repeated by the crowds in attendance. In order to emphasize the harmony that was prevailing, the other side would yell, "Hurrah for Jim Harris!"

The proceedings from this time on were characterized by the bitterness of feeling. Someone nominated Turk of Checotah for treasurer. Another stand-patter immediately moved that nominations be closed. Before the motion could be put the insurgents were thrown into a frenzy of laughter by Omar Bonedict inquiring in a loud voice: "Is this agreeable at Washington?" Then the whole crowd would occupy a few minutes by yelling, "Postmaster, postmaster!"

Neglect by State in the Enforcement of Law is the Most General Complaint, With the Most Disastrous Consequences.

Washington, Jan. 17.—It were unwise to think of absolute uniformity of legislation throughout the United States, in the opinion of Alton B. Parker as expressed today in an address before the Convention on Uniform State Laws.

on earth so efficient as the government of the United States Steel Corporation from a purely business standpoint. Every step it takes is in obedience to a master mind. But it may safely be said that no one would be willing to have our government thus managed, however much national wealth might be augmented each year. "We are ambitious, it is true, for wealth and the comforts it brings, but we have not yet lost our faith in the proposition that the object of government is the greatest good to the greatest number. It is desirable therefore now, as it was in the beginning, that we should endure a less efficient form of government in order to avoid the greater evils which would otherwise arise."

## Boone Taliaferro OFFINS AND CASKETS

"Uniformity should be promoted along the lines marked out by the Commissioners on Uniform Laws, and as much further as the diversities to which I have referred will reasonably permit.

"A movement has recently been inaugurated to make each industry bear the burden of accident to employees, without regard to the question of negligence, upon the ground that such burden is properly a part of the cost of the product. It has been accepted as founded on sound business principles, and put in operation by some employers already who recognize that otherwise great unfairness often results in casting upon the employee and his family the entire burden of accident. Legislation in England and Germany thus provides for the compensation to be paid to injured employees. The English statute provides for compensation during disability, equal to fifty per cent of the wage rate, and in case of death or total disability, a sum equal to four years' wages. Surely this country ought not to lag behind those enlightened nations in righting what is now the most monstrous injustice of the age. Nevertheless that is likely to happen unless there be uniform legislation in many, if not all, the states on the subject. For in the absence of a general movement for uniform legislation, New Jersey, for instance, would hesitate to place her contractors at a disadvantage in competing with New York contractors.

"From this convention now assembled representing, not one or many, but all the civic interests of each and all of the states, there should go out an authoritative expression in favor of uniform legislation in so far as it is conducive to the common weal. Let us strive to promote unity in diversity—unity in all that touches in like manner the internal affairs of the communities separated by state lines—diversity in those particulars which are peculiar to each commonwealth."

Judge Parker thus closed his address after having reviewed in detail the complicated relations between state and national governments. In this respect he said:

"Latterly complaints have arisen of inefficiency resulting from the division of powers between the federal and the state governments. It is said, depending upon the point of view, that some states grant charters which are far too broad, while others go to the opposite extreme. That in some states the law has not been enforced against disobedient corporations and their officers, while in others the tendency is to presume them guilty of a desire to violate all law, written or unwritten.

"The public complaint for the present is more generally that the states have been lax in the enforcement of law, with most disastrous consequences. The charge of neglect must be admitted by all who appreciate that every one of the corporation now struggling for life was created in the face of the law under which they are now prosecuted—a law which by reason of its deliberate non-enforcement was assumed by the corporation founders to be more honored in the breach than in the observance."

"This is not the time to consider whether the one government or the other is the more responsible for this condition. For the claim is that in any event efficiency is sacrificed in the dual form of government, and that in the interest of business prosperity efficiency is of greater importance than all else.
