### CARTER HEARD FROM ON INDIAN SUFFRAGE

CALLS HOUSE TO TASK FOR ITS SHORT-SIGHTED POLICY IN NOT ALLOWING INDIANS TO VOTE.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 18.—For the third time the house of representatives passed a bill today giving separate statehood to the territories of Mexico and Arizona. The vote was taken amid applause.

The absence of opposition to the measure was the most striking feature of the debate.

The bill provides the limitations that are to prevail in the power of the states to legislate, restricting the sale of liquor among the Indians and providing methods for state organization. Friends of the measure declare they have encouraging assurances of its passage by the senate.

Arizona and New Mexico Indians not taxed will not be able to vote if the statehood bill is enacted into a law. The provisions as might be expected, proved most offensive to Representative C. D. Carter of Ardmore, the only Indian statesman in the lower house, and he at once called the house to task for this abandonment and what he called short-sighted policy upon the part of the administration.

"The fact of not taxing an Indian is not a test of his ability to exercise the privilege of suffrage," declared the Ardmore congressman. Continuing he said: "Why, in my state none of the Indians were taxed on their allotted lands when the statehood bill was passed, yet you permitted them all to vote. The same statement applies to the states of Idaho and Wyoming, but now you are harking back to days before the Indian question was understood as well as it is now, when the plan was to separate the Indian from the white man, excluding him from the privileges of the white man and keeping him tied down on the reservation. The very Indian department of this government was organized for the purpose of making competent and self-reliant citizens of the Indians. Now how are you going to make a United States citizen of a man unless you make a citizen of him to all intents and purposes? How are you going to make him a citizen and still hold from him the privilege of voting, the privilege of expressing his choice upon men and measures which are the dearest of all privileges to the civilized, liberty-loving citizen?"

Representative Carter contended that the mere fact of making the Indian a citizen would be one of the strongest influences to induce him to rise and meet the responsibilities of such citizenship.

He was in favor of having all Indians being made citizens at once, thus eliminating the prejudice against any Indian who takes the oath of allegiance while the remainder of the tribe do not.

### MURRAY'S SLATE SEEN SOME SAY

POLITICIANS BELIEVE THAT OFFICES ARE PARCELLED OUT BY GENERAL UNDERSTANDING

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 18.—A tolerably well-defined slate for all of the state offices seems to have been arranged by the supporters of Murray for governor, the combination in support of this lineup being generally expected to include Governor C. N. Haskell, although the governor will probably not take any active part in the fight.

According to the way the politicians have figured it out the Murray slate will include A. H. Ellis of Orlando for lieutenant governor, Ben Harrison of Calvin for secretary of state, Secretary of State Bill Cross for state auditor, Robert Dunlop of Newkirk for state treasurer, Charles Evans of Ardmore for state superintendent, Milas Lisater of Pauls Valley for insurance commissioner, Orville T. Smith of Guthrie for attorney general, and J. C. Graham of Marfetta for corporation commissioner.

Some changes in the lineup are possible. Col. J. J. McAlister, present corporation commissioner, might be put in the state for that place, and either W. F. Gilmer of Ardmore or E. M. Landrum of Tahlequah might be taken up for state auditor.

A. M. Yonng, present bank commissioner, would have been first choice for state treasurer if he had gotten into the race, but he has decided not to do so.

It is understood none of the justices of the supreme court or criminal court of appeals who are up for re-election this year will be opposed for re-nomination.

It is also probable that the Murray crowd, which would like to make an lean sweep of the present state officials will not oppose either Labor Commissioner Charles Daugherty or Miss Kate Barnard, state commissioner of charities and corrections. Murray does not like Miss Barnard, however, and may decide to make a fight against her.

A candidate will be brought out against State Examiner and Inspector Charles Taylor, who will be a candidate for re-election, but it has not been fully decided as yet who it will be.

Other candidates who are not on the slate are preparing for a strenuous fight against it and if they can get together for an organized opposition they may make trouble enough for the Murray men to force the abandonment of the slate.

#### Thompson Will Not Resign.

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 18.—When the democratic state executive committee meets in Oklahoma City about February 1, Chairman J. B. Thompson of Pauls Valley will not tender his resignation, but will serve until a new committee is elected in the August primaries. He will not be a candidate for re-election, according to statements of his friends tonight, nor will he enter the race for attorney general.

It is proposed to name a campaign committee at the Oklahoma City meeting and give it a chairman for the purpose of organizing for the state campaign, and the general state committee will oversee the work in an advisory way.

### HERE IS THE DOPE ON DENNIS FLYNN

BALLINGER'S RESIGNATION EXPECTED AT ANY TIME—FLYNN TO BECOME HIS SUCCESSOR.

Guthrie, Okla., Jan. 18.—Circulating the story that Dennis T. Flynn, experimental delegate, personal friend of Vice President Sherman and Speaker Cannon, expects to land the secretaryship of the interior upon the resignation of Secretary Ballinger, which is expected by politicians here, republican gubernatorial aspirants declare that Flynn will not be a candidate for the republican nomination.

With the story comes a remarkable impetus to the boom of John Fields, editor of the Fargo Journal, Oklahoma City, and in the event of the withdrawal of Flynn, Fields is looked upon as having a good chance to become the next republican nominee. Politicians are gathering here for the special legislative session, which opens Jan. 26, and are here for the meeting of the republican state committee.

Ex-governor Ferguson, a warm personal friend of Flynn, held a conference with the ex-delegate in Okla.

Indiana City a week ago and as a result, his candidacy for the republican nomination is practically announced.

Walter Ferguson, his son, editor of the Cherokee Republican, is circulating among the legislators feeling the strength of the Ferguson boom.

The story as widely believed here, is that Flynn had almost decided to make the race until the sudden news of the Ballinger-Phelan feud, which erupted in the congressional investigation call it is believed that Flynn decided that after the congressional whitewash had been applied to Ballinger the secretary of the interior will resign rather than embarrass the president's candidacy to succeed himself and face renewed attacks of the insurgent wing in the republican party.

Believing in the impending resignation, Flynn is campaigning on the job in the assurance of powerful support from the national regulars and the backing of the republican congressional delegation from Oklahoma.

The Fields following appears more interested with the possibility of Fields refusing to enter the race than with the prospects of his being beaten.

Joseph McNeil, Guthrie banker, has considerable support in the northwest, and C. G. Jones, republican minority leader, has some support in the southern counties.
