

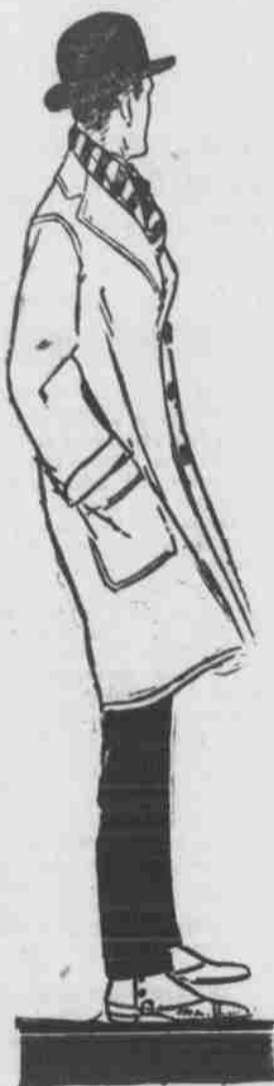

## P. H. S. WITHDRAWAL AROUSES CRITICISM

Schools of Other Towns in County Make Caustic Comment on Excuse Given by Local Debating Team for Dropping Out of League.

Pendleton is drawing some sharp criticisms from the schools of other towns in the county for withdrawing from the debating league after the schedule had been made out and when the various teams were ready to begin the elimination contests. The excuse given, lack of material, does not seem to satisfy the other schools, which point out that Pendleton is the largest school in the county and certainly would not have any more difficulties than the smaller schools. The following comment is made by the Athena Press of yesterday: "With Pendleton's withdrawal, only Athena and Milton are left in this end of the county and they will have but one debate. The winner will then meet the winning team of the other end of the county. Pendleton's excuse for dropping out is that the members of the debate teams would graduate at this semester and also that they could not get suitable material to work on the question. Consistent comment is being made by other schools concerning their belated decision, as they had identically the same material as the rest of the league."

### PICTURED VOICES UPON A SCREEN

Prof. Miller of Cleveland Exhibits an Invention of His Called a Phonodeik.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Prof. Dayton B. Miller, of the Case School of Applied Science, Cleveland, showed some of the delegates to the A. A. A. S. convocation their voices yesterday in the gymnasium of Columbia.

He did it by means of a "Phonodeik," a mechanism of his invention that projects "photographs" of the human voice on a screen. The "photographs" are like phonograph records and as sound waves from them fall upon a sensitive diaphragm mirror

transmit along a beam of light the "shivers" of the diaphragm. When Prof. Miller cried "War!" into a reversed megaphone attached to the Phonodeik, what he described as a "nightmare of convulsions" appeared on the screen. When he cried "Peace" there was a regular, delicately outlined glow. There was some difference in the pitch at which the two words were spoken but the disparity between the images was more striking than was to be accounted for on this score alone.

A record of Caruso's voice produced a regular image when he sang in his natural register. When he climbed up the scale the line of light danced madly up and down, till the image was a splash. A record of Tetrazzina's voice did not splash un-

til she reached high B, and even then the image was regular. Prof. Miller believes that the "Phonodeik" may have a valuable use in determining the quality of voices before their cultivation is attempted.

CIVIL WAR LEADER DIES. BERLIN, Jan. 5.—Peter Osterhaus, the last serving major general of the United States forces in the civil war, died at Dulburg. He is the father of Rear Admiral Osterhaus of the United States navy.

### DANCED TO WIRELESS MUSIC SENT 31 MILES

Gaty House Party in Morristown Had Fox Trots Played at Highbridge Plant.

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—Dancing to music transmitted by wireless was a novelty offered last night to guests at a house party in the home, in Morristown, N. J., of Theodore Gaty, vice president of the Fidelity and Casualty company. The music was played in the laboratory of the De Forrest Radio Company at Highbridge, this city, and was received at the Gaty home on an instrument so delicate that it has picked up radio signals sent from the German government station at Berlin.

The fox trots and waltzes played 31 miles from the Gaty home were made sufficiently loud by an amplifying device designed by P. F. Goodley, an electrical engineer of Montclair. The plan was suggested after music sent from the De Forrest laboratories had been heard by accident. Music has also come over the Gaty aerial from New Rochelle.

The receiver caught the sounds so distinctly that it recorded remarks of the sender and the grinding of the spring as the phonograph was wound. Mr. Gaty and his two sons, one of whom is a student at Cornell University, have made a hobby of wireless and have a very elaborate plant.
