One Business Man, However, Expresses Unpatriotic Sentiments and Patronize Leave Store.

Since the severance of diplomatic relations between the United States and Germany, there has been much speculation locally as to the attitude which German-American citizens will take. Within a minute practically every person had left his store, it is said.
