WILL CO-OPERATE WITH ALLIES IN EVERY WAY

United States Will Help Sweep Raiders and U-Boats From the Sea

By Carl D. Groat (United Press staff correspondent) Washington, April 9.—The United States will work in full harmony with the allies, it was officially stated at the navy department today.

In keeping with President Wilson's message to congress, "valuable cooperation will be undertaken."

Secretary Daniels declined to say when this cooperation goes into effect or to what extent it will be carried.

The presumption is that it is already under way, in part.

The cooperation is to be hearty and thorough. Preliminary discussion started Saturday continued yesterday and doubtless other meetings will be held today.

For the present, it is likely that the American navy will direct its efforts at clearing a part of the Atlantic of submarines and raiders, giving the allies a greater freedom of action than has been possible without American aid.

Incidentally, reports of one or more raiders in the Atlantic persisted again today, though the navy idea generally was that the Nantucket Shoals "raider" was only a drifting derelict.

Aside from cooperation between the United States and the allies the sincere cooperation of labor—a gigantic factor—has been pledged to the government.

Spraying Experiments Will Be Made Soon by O. A. C. Experts

Experiments in spraying, both liquid and dry, will be carried on in the general experimental work this spring under the supervision of Prof. H. P. Bass of the O. A. C. Tests will be made on the orchards of the Oregon state hospital, blocking off a certain number of trees for the dry spray and a like number for the liquid method.

The experiments this year will be carried on mostly for apple mildew, apple scab, San Jose scale, gooseberry mildew, currant anthracnose and locustberry anthracnose at the state institution tracts.

On the tracts of W. T. Jenks the experiments will be for prune blossom blight and brown rot. At the Winstley place, beyond the county poor farm, the experiments will be for California peach blight. On the George W. Weeks place, for pear scab. Experiments for pear scab will also be held at the E. E. Evans tract, near the Kaiser school. Cherry brown rot and blossom blight will be treated at the Hooper place in the Sunnyside district. Cylindrosporium experiments will be tested on the C. O. Constable tract and on the Constable Lona Maple orchard for leaf spot on prunes, one of the worst diseases of the coast.

Mr. Bass says that all the varieties of peaches susceptible to scab will be about right for spraying the first time next week with lime sulphur one to 25 or Bordeaux 4-4-50. This should be followed by another before the blossoms open. Every bud should be covered, he says.

Bulletins of the proper methods and mixtures for spraying may be had by writing the O. A. C. Prof. Bass will return next week with an assistant to begin the work on the state hospital tracts.
