## RED CROSS GIVES \$300,000 FOR RELIEF WORK IN NEAR EAST

The Red Cross war council has appropriated \$300,000 to be expended in July for relief work in the Near East through the American committee for Armenian and Syrian relief. The Red Cross will appropriate a like amount for each of the five remaining months of this year if the work of the committee is not sufficiently hampered by the Turkish government to make further grants inadvisable.

The American committee is the only organization outside of the Red Crescent (controlled by the Turkish government), which is allowed to administer relief in certain portions of the Turkish empire. Its field of operations includes not only Asia Minor and those portions of Armenia and Syria that are in the Ottoman empire, but it also includes a large section of Armenia now dominated by the Russian army, as well as the Russian Caucasus, Persia, Mesopotamia, and portions of Egypt and Macedonia, into which refugees, Armenians, Syrian and Greek have fled in large numbers. With the exception of the work being done by the Jewish relief committee, the American committee is the only agency organized for affording relief in this great area.

### Cooperating With Relief Agencies.

The making of this appropriation by the Red Cross is in accord with the policy of the Red Cross to cooperate with relief agencies in the theater of war to the end that there shall be the utmost aid afforded, while overlapping of effort is as far as possible avoided. The appropriation is made upon application of James L. Barton, chairman, and C. V. Vickrey, secretary, respectively, of the American committee for Armenian and Syrian relief, and after investigation is thoroughly approved by the Red Cross committee on cooperation of which Judge Robert S. Lovett is chairman.

The appeal to the Red Cross for aid estimates that there are 2,000,000 people in western Asia whose death can be prevented only by direct and continued help from this American committee. These people have been expelled from their homes and are in regions where self-support is practically impossible. From one town alone there is a call to provide for 10,000 fatherless children. The estimated number of orphans in another district is given by the American consul as 40,000. In the entire field the number of orphaned children is estimated to run into the hundreds of thousands.

Of the Armenians alone, nearly a million were massacred or driven to death in 1915, and the remainder of the race within the Turkish dominions were deported from their homes into the desert region where self-support was impossible. Since then approximately 500,000 Greeks, who formerly resided in prosperous villages south of the Black Sea, have been deported in similar manner and are now destitute and helpless.

### "Monkey" Allen Back at Pen.

DAYTON, Wash., July 31.—"Monkey" Allen who escaped from the penitentiary at Walla Walla a week ago, paid a visit to his cabin at Ballysburg Friday evening and later in the night he called at the Charles Harvey home in Dayton and asked for something to eat. He informed Mrs. Harvey that he had worked two or three days on a Coppel ranch and expected to get a job in harvest if the officers did not capture him. He stated that he was well treated at the penitentiary but he enjoyed his freedom and wanted to visit his friends and therefore took the opportunity to make his escape when left to irritate the bears. He was apprehended by G. D. Payne Saturday night and returned to the penitentiary by Mr. Payne and H. H. Hadley.

## DICTATOR OF RUSSIA ON THE FRONT



### "BE READY TO GIVE ALL" SAYS GIBBONS

#### Cardinal, on His Eighty-Third Birthday, Sends Word to Young Americans.

WESTMINSTER, Md., July 30.—Cardinal Gibbons celebrated his eighty-third birthday by taking it easy at the home of his intimate friend, T. Herbert Striver, at Union Mills. He was anxious to avoid interviews, but took occasion to express his views upon the heavy responsibilities of the Nation and people in the present world crisis.

The Cardinal expressed the opinion that only a small part of those who registered for the National Army would be sent abroad. However, he considered the enrollment and the training of a large army and a commensurate naval force necessary to guarantee the safety of the country from a foreign foe, and he sent the following message to the eligible young men:

"Americans, always remember that you owe all to America and be prepared, if your country demands it, to give all in return. I am sure you will bring honor and credit to the country of your birth or adoption."

Referring to the request of President Wilson and Mr. Hoover for his cooperation, the cardinal said: "I have assured them of my willingness and my desire to do so. The plan for co-operation on my part is that a letter will be sent with my consent, to every Nation in the United States; they, in turn, will get into touch with every pastor in every diocese and each pastor will take up the details in his congregation."

Just to keep the record clear, it is well to bear in mind that Nicola Lenin, the leader of the so-called "anarchist" forces in Russia, is not an anarchist, but a socialist of the German school, as are nine-tenths of the present trouble makers in Russia.

### CLUBBED TO DEATH TO DRIVE SPIRIT OUT

EVERETT, July 31.—Believing Bob Silvester possessed of an evil spirit, George Johns, James Jefferson, Lena Jefferson and Romeo Wilder, Indians, beat Silvester to death with clubs yesterday afternoon and buried his body in sand according to another Indian, who reported the murder to county officials today. All four are under arrest. All four are members of the Shakers, a religious sect which has a considerable number of adherents among the coast Indians. Their attack on Silvester took place when the latter, a cripple, entered John's house, where the four were preparing for the end of the world, expected at midnight tonight. They are understood to have attempted to drive away by the blow, the evil spirit which they believed possessed him.

In a rather lordly manner the Vossische Zeitung of Berlin, speaking of the capture of German steamships by the British off the Dutch coast, says: "The Dutch government must recognize that we require from it measures and not mere words if it attaches value to being regarded by us as really neutral." Why threaten the Dutch? The strict measures would be for the German navy to prevent the British from raiding their coal steamers.

### AIRPLANE FALLS KEEF BODILY HURT

MAINEFIELD, Ore., July 31.—Howard Keef, former secretary to Senator George E. Chamberlain and Dr. and Mrs. K. A. Leep of Merle Point, was injured, probably fatally in the fall of an air airplane at an American aviation station today, according to advices received by the parents. He was a member of the aviation corps. His parents left for his bedside.

### QUEEN'S "ARREST" A GERMAN MYTH

#### Was Circulated About Elizabeth of Belgium to Cause Dissension Among Allies.

PARIS, July 30.—German propagandists schooled to promote rumors designed to create dissension among the Allies are responsible for a report that Queen Elizabeth of Belgium was made a prisoner by the British for having supplied information to the enemy.

The story was circulated after the Germans made their successful drive in Belgium, near Neuport. It became so widespread that the Belgian authorities at Havre announced that any one who repeated the ridiculous tale would be prosecuted for "becoming unconsciously an accomplice of German manoeuvres by distributing calumnies against the Belgian sovereigns."

The action of King Victor Emmanuel of Italy in presenting a medal for military valor to Queen Elizabeth has gone far to refute in the minds of the people the rumor of her arrest. The Marquis Saragani, Italian Minister to Belgium, delivered the medal, which the Queen was informed, was emblematic of King Victor's admiration of the courage displayed by her since the beginning of the war.

### BIG FOOD RESERVE GOING TO FRANCE

#### Red Cross Sets \$1,500,000 Aside for Emergency Purposes Next Winter.

WASHINGTON, July 31.—The Red Cross War Council appropriated today \$1,500,000 for foodstuffs to be sent to France as an emergency reserve for use next winter by either American forces or civilian populations. The action was in response to a plea from Major Grayson Murphy, head of the Red Cross commission in France, saying: "We must begin to prepare for the coming hard winter and you cannot possibly send us more than we need of the following: Twenty-four-ton motor trucks, 50,000 yards of flannel, condensed milk, flour, dried or preserved vegetables, corned beef, canned beef, preserved fruits, sheep blankets, knitting wool, and heavy white cotton sheeting."

Supplies will be purchased for the Red Cross by the commission for relief in Belgium and special arrangements have been made for speedy shipment. They will be transported to storage places in France by a new Red Cross fleet of motor trucks.

### Probe Poisoning of Cattle.

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—State Veterinarian W. H. Lytle announced here today he would send men from his office to Clackamas county and the eastern section of Multnomah county to investigate reported poisoning of cattle. Stock owners of the

two counties have reported to the police they believed Industrial Workers of the World poisoned their cattle. Over 50 head have been lost.

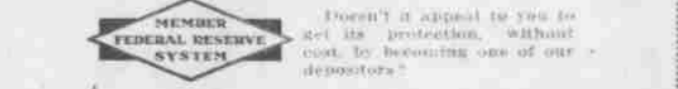
