### OVER THE NORTHWEST

#### Holiday Turkeys Discussed.

PORTLAND, Nov. 13.—Dealers, storage men and representative farmers met here late today with Food Administrator Newell to discuss the handling of turkeys during the holiday season.

Under plans laid this afternoon, the wholesalers and retailers will appoint a committee which will meet with Newell daily and set the turkey price for the next day. In this way, Newell hopes to furnish Thanksgiving and Christmas dinners at reasonable prices and, at the same time, insure the farmers and dealers a fair profit.

#### Loggers Heavy Eaters.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12.—A logger eats an average of 1.97 pounds of food at each meal, according to figures compiled by W. C. Roegner, of the Bridal Veil Lumber company. His figures are based on detailed reports from seven logging camps. The average total cost for each meal is placed at 27 cents by Roegner.

The amount of food consumed at the various camps varies generally his figures show. At one camp, the average was 2.55 pounds for each man's meal.

#### Thinks War Will Be Long.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 12.—A strip of the United States of America is going to be established in Germany, Major Caldwell said here today.

American soldiers will patrol that strip, the American flag will fly above it and good old United States will be the language spoken.

More than that, the major declares, "our power is going to extend to Berlin, but we've got a long, hard road ahead of us. Experts agree this is going to be a long war. We are just now on the threshold." Major Caldwell advocates uni-

versal military training in the public schools and drastic action against pacifists, who he terms the enemy of democracy.

#### Many at Camp Lewis.

CAMP LEWIS, Tacoma, Wash., Nov. 13.—The population of Camp Lewis is nearing its maximum. Practically all the men of the first draft from the western states are assembled here.

Small numbers of stragglers will continue to arrive for the next two or three weeks, making up deficiencies in past quotas and for discharges for disability or exemption.

#### Laborers Want Meat.

SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 13.—The laboring man's restaurant is having a lot of trouble with "meatless Tuesday."

Manual laborers, restaurant men say, demand lots of meat.

"I wouldn't dare break it too suddenly," declared one proprietor of a chop house. "The fellows I serve couldn't stand the strain. I'm breaking em in a little by little. Today I'm featuring pork and beans."

"All same all time," was the comment of a Chinese restaurant man. "Me calcium rice, calcium noodle. Buy the calcium pork. Me tellum see Honorable Hoover, give 'em chow much, give 'em noodle, give 'em rice—no give'm meat."


#### Soap Price Is Soaring.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12.—Now is the high cost of keeping clean.

Increasing demands for soap and a decrease in the quantity of fats, glycerin, resin and other materials will force the retail price of soap still higher, dealers and manufacturers predict.

The price of soap has already taken several jumps recently.

### WHERE AMERICAN TROOPS WERE KILLED



From the Berlin account of the action against American troops on the French frontier it is believed it took place at the town of Parroy where the battle line crosses the Rhine-Marne Canal. Here it was that several days previous to the engagement which resulted in the death of three Americans and the wounding of more, the Germans captured several prisoners. This point is southeast of the Verdun battlefield, two miles from the German boundary. It was a quiet section of the line where American troops were being given their final training for war.



#### CREAMED FINNAN HADDIE.

First boil fish and remove the skin. Make a white sauce of 2 tablespoons of butter (heat) and add 1 tablespoon of flour in it, pinch of salt, and 1 cup of milk. Break up fish into small pieces and mix in the white sauce.

#### SCRAPPLE.

Clean and cut up a hog's head and remove all skin and larger bones. Let soak in salt water over night and next morning wash again and put over the fire in cold water enough to cover. Cook slowly until the bones separate from the meat; then drain, pick out all the bones and hard gristle and grind the meat fine. Strain the liquor and return it with the ground meat to the kettle, season with salt and pepper to taste; and when it begins to boil, stir in, slowly, enough cornmeal to thicken, adding some white flour to make it hold together.

#### FOAMY SAUCE AND APPLE DUMPLINGS.


Make a shortcake of 2 cups of flour, 2 tablespoons lard, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon soda and 2 teaspoons cream tartar, 1 cup milk. Peel and quarter apples, roll out dough, cut in squares and form in balls. Cook 1-2 hour.

Sauce—1 cup of sugar, 1 egg beaten (lightly), 1-4 cup of boiling milk, flavor with vanilla.

#### Rice and Wheat Meal Biscuit.

1 cup of rice flour.  
1 cup of wheat meal.  
1 teaspoon salt.

2 tablespoons baking powder. 1 tablespoon sugar. 4 tablespoons shortening. Liquid enough to mix (about 3-4 cup).

Sift together the flour, meal, salt and baking powder twice. Have the shortening as cold as possible and cut it into the mixture with a knife, finally rubbing it in with the hands. Mix quickly with the cold liquid (milk, skim milk or water), forming a fairly soft dough which can be rolled on the board. Turn onto a flour board, roll into a sheet not over 1-2 inch thick; cut into rounds; place these in lightly floured biscuit tins (or shallow pans), and bake 10 or 12 minutes in a rather hot oven.

#### CORN RECEIPTS

The following receipts were prepared after practical demonstration by some "old southern mammas" under the direction of the woman's food conservation committee of the Illinois State Council of Defense:

#### CORN PONE.

One cup of cornmeal.  
One-half cup of flour.  
Two tablespoons of melted fat.  
One-quarter cup of hot water.  
One-third cup of sweet milk.  
Three teaspoons of baking powder.  
Three-quarters teaspoon of salt.  
Mix cornmeal, flour and salt, add hot water and melted fat, then milk and stir well. Scatter the baking powder over the top and beat in with a spoon. Form into two rolls with the hands, place in well buttered pan and bake twenty minutes in a hot oven.

#### CORN BREAD.

One and a half cups of cornmeal.  
Quarter cup of flour.  
One egg.  
One teaspoonful of salt.  
Two tablespoonfuls of sugar.  
1 teaspoonful of baking powder.  
One teaspoonful of soda.  
Two cups of sour milk.  
Two tablespoonfuls of melted fat.  
Beat the egg, add cornmeal, flour, sugar and salt, then milk and beat. Add baking powder and melted fat, pour into well buttered tin and bake twenty minutes in a hot oven.

#### CORN MUFFINS.

One and one-half cups of cornmeal.  
One-half cup of flour.  
Two teaspoons of baking powder.  
One teaspoon of salt.  
Two tablespoons of melted fat.  
Two tablespoons of sugar.  
Two tablespoons hot water.  
One-half cup of milk.  
One egg.  
White or yellow cornmeal can be used in any of these recipes. All measurements are level.

#### HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

A piece of old stocking tied over a whisk broom makes the best kind of stove cleaner.  
A heated lemon is said to yield more juice than a cold one. Wash, sugar and dry lemon peel for flavoring fruit cakes and making puddings and mince pies.  
Do not cut off half an inch from the sewing machine foot when it stretches and becomes too loose to fit the wheel. Put a few drops of pure castor oil on the band and run the machine for a few minutes and the band will swell and tighten.
