GUARD COMPANIES MAY BE MERGED IN OREGON

Single State Division With Colonel Leader as Commander.


PORTLAND Or. May 8.—That the many units of the Home Guard in Oregon will soon be mustered into a single state division merging for the increased facility of training and availability as a cohesive military force is indicated by those in touch with the general plans of the State Council of Defense.
It is understood that Governor Withycombe has recommended such action and that the preliminary plans are now under consideration. To the present the numerous Home Guard organizations have been little more than local militia companies, which lacked common leadership while being at the disposal of the state.
It is definitely stated that Colonel John Leader, of the Royal Irish Rifles, now commander and instructor of the University of Oregon student battalion, has been offered the

command of the unified Home Guard division by Governor Withycombe and has signified his willingness to accept if no other candidate presses forward for the appointment.

Who Should Eat the Substitutes, We or They?

There is a scanty supply of wheat in the world's bin. Somewhere the deficit must be made up. France has again cut down her bread ration to about two-thirds of that heretofore maintained. Since bread constitutes over one-half of the diet of the French nation, this is a greater denial even than it sounds.
Shall we say to those women in France: "You are used to burdens and sacrifices after three years of it. Go on ahead and take on this one, too?"
Or shall we look upon this necessary re-adjustment of diet as the very smallest of war burdens and gladly spare them this?

Who can do it with the last inconvenience—they who are dependent on precarious shipping for their cereals, meats, and fats, or we who have plenty of non-wheat grains and an ample amount of other substitute foods?
Who can do it more easily—they who are paying \$1.00 to \$1.25 a ton for coal or we who still have, in comparison with them cheap and plentiful fuel?
Who can do it more easily—their whose incomes are reduced by war or we who have enough to pay the increased cost of the wheat substitutes?
Who can do it more easily—those women of England and France who are in the fields and factories carrying on the work of their men, or we who are still in our homes?

Upon your decision depends their efficiency in the war—our war.

ON WALK TO MAKE RAID BY HIMSELF

An interesting story of American initiative and daring is told by Dr. Morton Prince, in charge of the Bureau of Information and Welfare for Massachusetts Soldiers and Sailors in France, in a statement made public yesterday.

"The morale of our soldiers, as I saw for myself," writes Dr. Prince, "is wonderful." Not only are they full of courage, ready to fight, even those who are only two days out of the trenches anxious to go back, but actually happy like college boys at a football game, all smiling and laughing and anxious to get at the Boches again.

"A lieutenant of the U. S. A. told me the following: He had just come back from the trenches. He and his colonel were walking up a communicating trench to the first line trench when he saw ahead of him what he took to be a queer animal, something he had never seen before. He thought it a bear. His colonel said: 'Wait a minute'; then taking out his pistol he tipped to the animal, seized it by the back of the neck and found it to be an American soldier crawling on all fours. He had a potato bag on his back filled with bombs, which he had stolen, and leaving his command without orders he was going over No Man's Land to make a raid all by himself and smash the Boches single-handed."

"That story combines about as many American traits as are capable of being combined."
