## SOMETHING ABOUT ALBANY'S LINEUP

Details Meant to Show That Team Is Stronger Than When Salem Beat It Last Year.

It is announced from Albany that there will be several changes in the Albany lineup in Sunday's game, and the Albany bunch figure that the team is strengthened rather than weakened by the new men. The following was received from Albany yesterday by the sporting editor of The Capital Journal: "Bill Patterson and Lyle Bigbee, both of whom were of last year's pitching staff, will twirl again this year, Patterson has pitched all of the games the team has played so far, and appears to be in as good shape as ever. Bigbee has been pitching for the University of Oregon team, and has established a reputation on the Northwest college circuit. He has not played with the Albany team in any of the games thus far, but will be on hand next Sunday. Dave Patterson is catching again this year.

"The Dooley brothers, who played first base and second base as last year's team, are not with Albany this year, as they went to Montana, but to fill their places Manager Senders has secured Claud Swan and K. C. Kolbert, two Corvallis boys. Swan is probably the best second baseman in the valley, and Kolbert handles himself well at the initial sack. Swan fills his position much better than did George Dooley, and Kolbert is fully as steady as last year's first baseman, and both lads are better hitters than the Dooleys. While they don't clout out the long drives that characterized Eugene Dooley's hitting, they are far more reliable hitters, especially in the pinches.

"Carson Bigbee, who is rated as the best amateur infielder in the state, is playing third base again this year. Notwithstanding a rumor to the contrary, Bigbee has played with Albany thus far this season, and will be on hand next Sunday to participate in the contest against the Salem Senators. "Minnie" Lee, who has been playing shortstop, left this week for Enterprise, and will play there, so will not appear in the Albany lineup next Sunday. As Lee has not been showing up very well, anyway this year, his loss will not be felt.

"Manager Senders has not determined who will play shortstop next Sunday, but it will likely be either Ryals or Grant. Ryals is a lad who played last year on the Albany high school team, and is showing lots of class. Grant has not been playing any this year, but began working out yesterday, and if he gets in shape will make a strong showing in the Albany team. "Michel, last year's hard-hitting left fielder, and leading batsman of the old Tri-City league, is playing left field again this year. Captain Monson, probably one of the best outfielders in the state, is again in center field and is back in his old hard-hitting form. Monson had a batting slump the latter part of last year, but is hitting hard this year, and batted 1000 per cent against the Portland Northwest-ern league team here recently.

"While Patterson is pitching Lyle Bigbee will play right field. Bigbee batted well last year, and has been hitting like a fiend at the university this spring. When Bigbee goes in the box right field will be filled by Martin or Ryals, unless the latter is playing shortstop.

"With the possible exception of shortstop, which is yet more or less of an unknown quantity, Albany will have as strong an infield as any team in the valley. The Albany players expect a close game next Sunday, and whichever team wins will have a hard fight for the honors."

## PHYSICAL BETTERMENT TO BE THE OBJECT

Dr. Sweetland, athletic director at Willamette university, has announced that physical examination will be given to all male students of the university. The intent of the examination is the weak points of each man's physique and finding the overworked muscles in order that the weaknesses may be remedied by proper effort and exercise and the parts that are being overworked may resume their normal condition. Many people one-sided in their views allow their physique to be developed in a one-sided way and as a result, severe injuries and often disfigurement for life result. It is therefore highly important a person be without weak points in his physique.

Dr. Sweetland will visit the east during the coming vacation to take a post-graduate course in physical work and will install a systematic course next year which all men in the university will be required to take.

Much new apparatus has been added to the equipment of the doctor's office and everything is in readiness for speedy execution of the examinations.

Following the examination, the work each man should take will be assigned and beginning next fall aided by the new assistant athletic director, the doctor will conduct classes for the remedying of the different physical defects.

The work is recognized as being along practically lines and great good should result from carrying out the present plans.

## They Talk of Art

Washington, May 15.—More general attendance at art museums and the best way to increase the interest of the general public in all forms of art was the important subject discussed today at the opening session of the Fourth Annual convention of the American Federation of Arts. The foremost authorities on art in the United States were in attendance and made addresses. One point which was strongly urged and which is thought will exert a great influence in the right direction if adopted by those in charge of the country's art museums was the establishment of a more business like system in such institutions which will awaken public interest. One revolutionary suggestion was that all museums employ the same sort of press agent as is employed by theatres. Today's session opened with an address by Robert W. DeForest, of New York, president of the Federation. President and Mrs. Wilson were to be honor guests at a reception in the Corcoran art gallery this evening. Both the president and Mrs. Wilson have taken an active interest in the work of the Federation which will be their guests at a White House garden party tomorrow. Industrial art is the topic to be discussed tomorrow.
