THREE MORE BODIES. [UNITED PRESS LEASED WIRE.] St. Louis, March 13.—Three more corpses were taken this forenoon from the Missouri Athletic club ruins. This brought the number recovered up to 23. Fragments of other bodies were found but they were so badly burned it could not be told how many they represented.
