New School Building To Be Strictly Up To Date

The architectural features of the new school house to be erected this spring in South Salem on Mettlichrist and High streets include many of the ideas now being used in the construction of the better grade of schools.

The design will be a modification of Lombardy architecture, a type of buildings from northern Italy, showing a development between the Romanesque and Gothic types.

The building will be two stories high with a basement having its floor on a level with the grounds. The material to be used will be a cream colored brick, with a Spanish tiled roof. There will be adequate fire escapes so placed as not to interfere with the architectural beauty of the building.

The basement will contain two large sized play rooms and on each floor, four class rooms. Special attention has been given by Architect George M. Post to the lighting of the rooms. The area of light for each room is one-fourth of the floor space, this being the proportion recommended by the leading educators of the country.
