Million Prussians Are Lost to Date

London, April 6.—The last eight official Prussian casualty lists, No. 166 to No. 172, contain 33,142 names, bringing the grand total of killed, wounded and missing since the war began to 1,050,029 men, according to a dispatch to the Evening News from Copenhagen. The last four lists include the names of 11 airmen killed, four wounded, and two taken prisoners. It should be borne in mind that these totals refer to Prussia. They do not take into account 160 Bavarians, 136 Wurttemberg, 118 Saxon, and 20 navy lists.

Denver, Colo., April 7.—"E. B. Rogers," who claims to be the son of the editor of the San Francisco News Letter, and the brother of the publisher of the "Exposition Daily," today waived examination here on a charge of having passed fraudulent checks. He is declared to have passed bad checks calling for an aggregate of \$175.
