HARRIMAN IS LAID TO REST Workmen Lay Harriman In Tomb. Funeral Ceremonies Private.

Arden, N. Y., Sept. 13.—Through the quiet aisles of Ramapo woods, the body of Edward Henry Harriman was carried Sunday from the great house he never lived to see completed, and laid in its last resting place on the Arden hillside.

The rulers of Wall street came from New York to pay their last tribute, but the most prominent part in the ceremony was taken by the men who knew him best as a country squire and master of the great estate, which covers 43,000 acres of hill and valley.

His general superintendent, his master carpenter, his master mason and the managers and assistant managers of his dairies, his farms and his trotting stables bore his coffin. The funeral was private and only those who were personal friends of the family and had received invitations were admitted.

As a silent tribute to the master every train on any of the railroads Mr. Harriman organized was stopped for one minute while he was being laid to rest.

Death Causes No Drop in Stocks.

New York, Sept. 13.—The long suspense in which the financial world had been held by the declining health of E. H. Harriman was ended by his death, and speculative attention turned promptly to the future. The prices of securities mounted buoyantly upwards on the news of the death of the man whose plans and activities involved more widespread interest and material hopes probably than any other individual of his generation.

LOVETT MADE CHAIRMAN

Legal Head of Union Pacific Is Elected Chief Executive.

New York, Sept. 13.—William Rockefeller and Jacob H. Schiff were elected directors of the Union Pacific Railroad today succeeding Henry H. Rogers and E. H. Harriman. They were also appointed members of the Executive Committee.

The board of directors elected Robert S. Lovett, chairman of the executive committee to succeed Mr. Harriman.

Kings of Finance Form Alliance.

New York, Sept. 14.—J. P. Morgan, Jr., succeeds the late E. H. Harriman on the board of directors of the National City Bank. By Wall street the election is regarded as most significant, presumably indicating that harmonious relations exist between the Morgan and the Kuhn, Loeb-Standard Oil financiers.

Wide importance was given the event because it followed closely upon reports that the Morgan interests were about to take an active interest in the Harriman roads and that the younger Morgan will immediately succeed Harriman in command of the Union Pacific and Southern Pacific systems.

Salem.—A number of important matters await the return of Governor Benson from California, among them the appointment of a member of the State Board of Agriculture to succeed the late M. D. Wisdom. State Dairy and Food Commissioner Bailey and N. C. Maris, the latter editor of Wisdom's farm paper, have been mentioned for the appointment.

EVENTS IN OUR STATE OF MINOR IMPORTANCE

Hood River.—The jury in the Robb's murder case found George Robb, aged 21 years, guilty of murder in the second degree for killing Mrs. Castoe at his father's house. Under the law this verdict carries with it a life sentence in the penitentiary.

Eugene.—H. B. Miller, of Eugene, United States Consul-General at Yokohama, Japan, has given up his post there and accepted the post of Consul at Belfast, Ireland, the change having been made at his own request on account of his health being very poor in Japan.

Astoria.—Fall fishing season has opened with much more gear in the water than usual at this season of the year. While there has been practically no illegal fishing during the closed season, there are known to be a large number of slyersides in the river and good catches of that variety of fish are expected.

Portland.—Four hundred census enumerators will be appointed to make a count of the people in Oregon next April, an increase of 21 over the number employed 10 years ago. The preliminary reports upon which the census office makes this apportionment fail to show the need of a greater number.

Klamath Falls.—J. Frank Adams, one of the original promoters of irrigation in Klamath County, has about matured plans to place on his Lakeside tract at the head of Tule Lake 160 Bohemian families. This tract is the exact locality where the Tule Lake settlers were massacred by the rebellious Modocs of the famous Captain Jack's band on the morning of November 29, 1872.

Roseburg.—At a meeting of the Roseburg Commercial Club, with representatives of the Chambers of Commerce of Marshfield and North Bend, it was decided to raise \$6000 to finance the completion of the railroad survey from Coos Bay to Roseburg. The plan is after the survey is completed and rights of way secured, to offer them to any capitalists wanting to build the railroad.

Portland.—The Secretary of the Interior has withdrawn from entry southwest quarter of section 29, township 25 south, range 14 east, in Lake County, Oregon, until the Geological Survey can make an examination of the peculiar formation on this land, known as Fortrock. If this landmark is considered of sufficient importance, it will be permanently reserved as a National monument.

Eugene.—The annual fair of the Second Southern Oregon Agricultural Society was the most successful fair ever held here. The people of Eugene and Lane County will hereafter hold annually a county fair, taking advantage of the appropriation for the district as Lane County has its turn. In this district are also Douglas, Coos and Curry Counties, which will take their turns in holding the district fair.

Albany.—A deed and mortgage governing the ownership of the leading public-service corporations of several cities of the Pacific Northwest was filed with the County Recorder of Linn County. The deed transfers practically all of the property of the Willamette Valley Company to the Northwest Corporation, and the latter corporation mortgages all of its property for \$5,000,000 to the Germantown Trust Company of Philadelphia.

Portland.—Federal Judge Bean has dismissed the application for a receiver for the Deschutes Irrigation & Power company recently asked by Columbus, Ohio bondholders. The company made representation to the court tending to show that though it had obligations amounting to over \$800,000, it would be able to liquidate them, provided the development of its irrigation projects in central Oregon were not interfered with by the court.
