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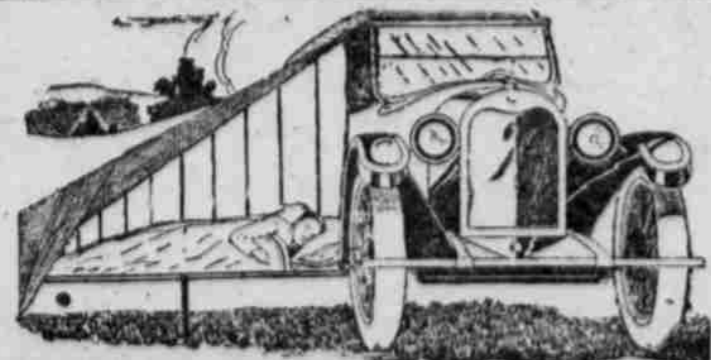
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**UNIVERSITY RECORDS 2000 MEN IN SERVICE**

Questionnaires Not All In; Cards Show Two Colonels and Five Lieutenant Colonels.

University of Oregon, Eugene, May 7.—Two thousand students of the University of Oregon served in the war, according to a service record just completed by Emma Wootton Hall, secretary of military affairs on the campus. Thirteen ranks are represented in the list headed by two colonels and five lieutenant colonels. Colonel Creed Hammand, of Eug-

are 490 men. The list includes 2 colonels, 5 lieutenant colonels, 26 majors, 80 captains, 297 1st lieutenants, 176 2nd lieutenants, 6 senior lieutenants, 20 ensigns, 1 Red Cross captain and 7 Y. M. C. A. officers. Of privates and rank unknown, are 544 men and 26 women. Forty-three men died in the service. Something over 600 men enlisted while members of the University students body and something like over 500 saw overseas service. The list is not entirely complete as the questionnaires which were sent out have not all been returned.

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
