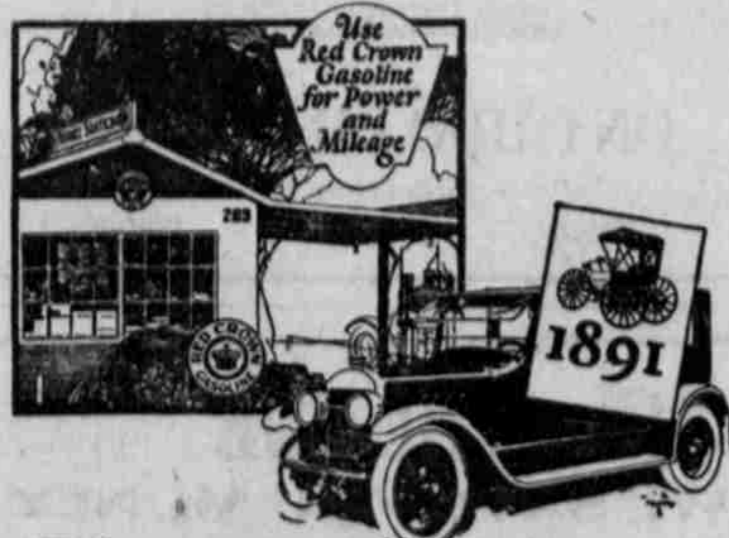

POULTRY DEMONSTRATION FARM ESTABLISHED

An agreement has been signed between A. B. Cain of Cairo who is county leader on Poultry work for the Farm Bureau, H. E. Cosby, Extension Specialist in Poultry, Paul V. Maris, Director of Extension, and County Agent Brethaupt whereby Mr. Cain will cooperate in conducting a poultry demonstration farm under the instructions of Mr. Cosby for the benefit of the poultrymen of Malheur County. Mr. Cain furnishes all stock and equipment and the Extension Service furnishes necessary record blanks and guidance in conducting the work.

Mr. Cain will keep three or four hundred laying hens which will be fed, housed and cared for in approved manner. He will also do incubation work and all other lines of activity connected with the poultry business. It is planned to make this demonstration farm a meeting place for the poultrymen of the county and it is expected that Mr. Cosby will conduct meetings on special phases of the poultry business there, three or four times a year. This will give the poultrymen an opportunity to see first hand approved methods of handling poultry and get the benefit of Mr. Cosby's instruction.

RANCHERS LOSING BECAUSE NO MARKET FOR THEIR EGGS

Caldwell Man Declares Weekly Loss To Ranchers of Southwestern Idaho Is Two Thousand Dollars Weekly Ranchers In Same Fix

Southwestern Idaho farmers are losing \$2000 every week that the Pacific Poultry Producers is not in operation, according to estimates made by Jess Gowen, secretary of the Caldwell Commercial club, and temporary local manager of the arrangements being made in Caldwell for opening a receiving station of the poultry marketing association here. The difference in quotations on eggs is given as the basis for this loss which is shared by every poultry producer in this section. Immediately upon opening the receiving station and the shipping out of a small surplus of eggs produced in this district, market quotations on eggs will increase about 15 cents per dozen. It is that 15 cents on every dozen eggs produced here that is being lost at present," says the Caldwell Tribune.

What is true of the ranchers of Southern Idaho is also true of the ranchers of Malheur county, for conditions here are identical to that which prevails about Caldwell and Nampa.

Continuing the Tribune says: "Plans are now being laid for a final clean-up campaign of all territory not yet completely worked for the egg marketing associations. Several thousand hens are known to be 'at large' in Canyon county and many thousand in Ada county are as yet not affiliated with the marketing association. Producers who have already joined the association are urged to exercise their influence in having their neighbors sign contracts or at least to turn over the names of producers to the Commercial club or to the farm bureau office.

U. L. Upson, manager of the Portland branch of the association, left Friday for Portland after cleaning up on results of the work done thus far. The building that will be used as a receiving station is being remodelled to be ready just as soon as sign-up work is complete. A check on the totals thus far obtained show that not more than 100,000 hens have been signed up. Mr. Upson insists upon at least 125,000 before the receiving station opens.

"In correspondence with Mr. Gowen, Mr. Upson pointed out that it was doubly important that this work be completed shortly, since producers were losing heavily at present and that the annual election of the board of directors is held in November and that it is to the interest of this district to complete organization in time to elect representatives to the board of directors of the association.

"With 125,000 hens, this branch of the association will be entitled to four of the 13 directors on the board."
