NEW LAW REGARDING GOVERNMENT LANDS

Register and Receivers, United States Land Office, Gentlemen:—Senate resolution of March 10, 1906, is as follows: Resolved, That the secretary of the interior be, and he is hereby, directed to furnish to the state, on the first Monday of December, 1906, the names of the persons, firms and corporations who conveyed or relinquished to the government of the United States and within the limits of government forest reserves, and who duly recorded the same in the proper county prior to the act of March 3rd, 1906, and who had prior to said act failed to select other public lands in lieu of the lands so conveyed or relinquished, or who have failed, through no fault of their own, to obtain patents to lands selected by them in lieu of lands so conveyed or relinquished, as provided by the act of June fourth, 1897, and who can not on account of said act of March 3rd, 1906, make such selection, and also report the numbers of acres so conveyed or relinquished. That in order to procure such information the secretary of the interior is hereby authorized and directed to require all such persons, firms and corporations to file in the land department, within a time to be by him designated, such proofs of their conveyance or relinquishment as he may prescribe; and he is further authorized and directed to make such further rules and regulations as may be necessary to procure the information hereby required.

In an article headed "Record Prices for Spitzbergen" the Oregon Journal of Friday says: "Temporarily, at least, the Medford fruit district has the penchant for Spitzbergen apples. Colonel Washburn, a Rogue River valley grower, has just baked an order from Colonel C. R. Ray, of Topeka, for October delivery at \$4.50 per box. Eastern people can better comprehend this quotation when it is explained that \$1.00 is paid for apples in a box containing but a few pounds in excess of one bushel. The choicest apples grown in the east bring entire satisfaction to their growers if they yield half that amount per bushel." When shown the above those at Hood River familiar with the apple situation in Oregon say that the highest price obtained for Spitzbergen for commercial purposes at Medford this year was \$1.50 per box and that the price mentioned is evidently one obtained for a few boxes of extra fancy apples for private use. Sales of this character they say have been made at Hood River for prices far in excess of \$4.50 per box but they do not consider them as indicating the standard of price for the district where they are grown. Will Supply Portland Hotel. Oscar Vanderbilt, who was in Portland Saturday, in talking about the apple situation at Hood River to an Oregon Journal reporter, said: "The price we received this year is the highest one ever paid the grower for an apple crop. Of course there have been larger prices paid for small fancy lots of apples. I have just sold about 30 boxes of winter banana apples at \$1.50 per box on joint account with a New York buyer who agrees to pay me 50 per cent of the profits he receives over that amount. It is believed by him that the apples will bring \$1.00 per box in New York." Mr. Vanderbilt, while in the city yesterday, made a contract with a New York buyer to furnish to him the hotel's winter supply of apples. A Mammoth Melon. George Hill is entitled to wear the championship of the world in the production of the melon. One of the melons of the week is a specimen of the same variety, that weighed 51 pounds.
