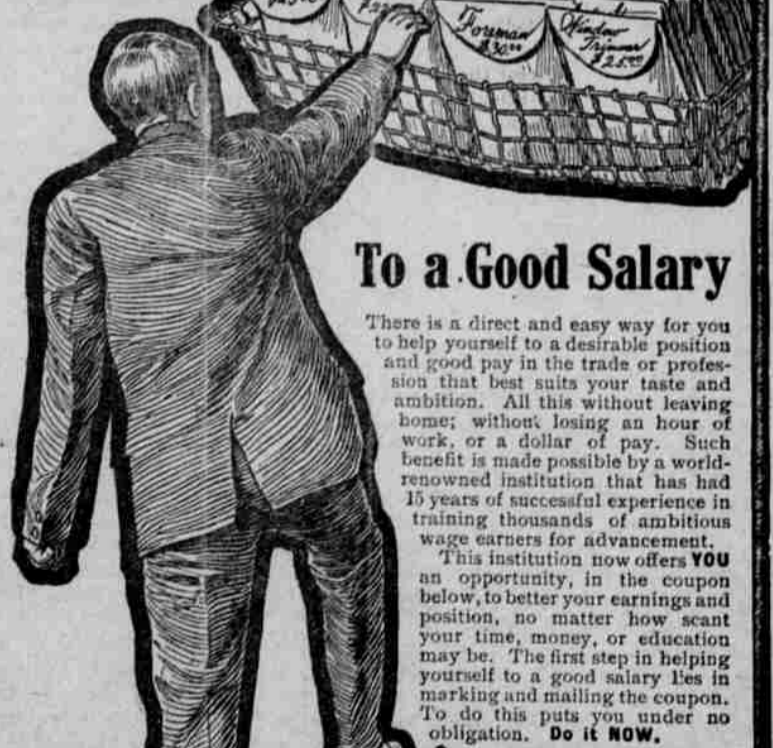

Current Events Throughout the Northwest.

New Payrolls, Improvements, Factories, and Enterprises That Will Give Employment to Labor.

North Plains has voted to erect a \$3000 school.

Grant Pass is ambitious for a federal building.

New Masonic Temple at Morton, nearly completed.

Bandon ship yards will have a new wharf 40x100 feet.

Dr. Dunham proposes to erect a hospital at Rainier.

European war may revive the flax industry in the Northwest.

Pendleton retailers will boost products of Pendleton manufacture.

November 21 bids will be opened for a concrete armory at Eugene.

Engineers are planning an irrigation project for Silver Lake Valley.

Cornucopia is now the largest gold and silver producing camp in Oregon.

There are 95,756 million board Oregon and Alaska forest reserves.

All forms of Washington public debt total \$95,000,000 or \$75 per capita.

With Glendale for a center three districts will unite in building a high school.

Marshfield is planning a drainage and sewer system to cost \$65,000 to \$75,000.

A. L. Hill, of Neodesha, Kan., has bought out the Wood Lumber Co., of Medford.

Warrenton, Hammond and Flavel will have electric light and power by January 1.

Gresham cannery and evaporator will handle cabbage and potatoes this month.

Portland Catholics have bought a \$16,000 site for a new church at Laurelhurst.

The new library building at the State University will be ready Thanksgiving.

Contract has been let for hard-surfacing Pacific Highway from Woodland to LaCenter.

E. E. Morrison is building a warehouse for explosives, three miles from Springfield.

The Western Coast Mining Co., have been taking out \$100 a day in their Bohemia mine.

Portland people are planning the establishment of another fruit evaporator at Hood River.

Salem, Ore., Nov. 19.—The Hill System will operate motor cars between Portland and Clatskanie.

Geo. Orr, a Modoc Indian is building up a large industry at Hood River in the manufacture of Indian wampum.

"Blanket" orders for lumber are being placed through the Douglas Fir Sales Co., at Portland, at better prices.

A thirty mile road is to be built from Prairie City to Long Creek to raise its rates by the state railroad commission.

It is deplorable that in the little city of Oreco there was more hoodlumism reported on Halloween than anywhere in Oregon.

The People's Transportation Co., operating boats between Portland and The Dalles, is building docks at Lyle, Mosier and Hood River.

If the Oregon Legislature heeds the wish of the people there will be mighty few laws passed at the coming session which interfere with our industries.

J. A. Almiral, a New York capitalist, will start work in the spring on a big irrigation project in the Powder Valley, Baker County, to Surprise Valley, from Ravendale, Calif., next spring.

A legislator who wishes to make a reputation at the next session of Oregon's law makers will devote exclusively to finding ways and means to reduce taxes and encourage development.

FRUIT GROWERS MEETING

On December 2, 3 and 4 the Twentieth annual meeting of the Oregon State Horticultural Society will be held at Medford. A program of great interest has been prepared for the event and fruit growers from all the northwest states will be in attendance. It is expected by the officers that this meeting will be the best ever held in the history of the organization.

TUMALO PROJECT TO OPEN

Portland, Ore., Nov. 17, 1914.—(Special.)—The opening of the Tumalo irrigation project, the first in the United States to be financed by a state, has been officially announced. Seventeen thousand five hundred acres are thrown open to entry under the terms of the Carey Act at \$40 an acre. The terms are one-tenth cash, the balance in ten years. Detailed information may be had by addressing the project engineer, O. Laurgaard, at Laidlow, Oregon.

It is stated that the lands under this project are excellent for grains and hardy vegetables, and stock raising is also successful. The high altitude renders this section subject to frosts in late spring and early fall and frosts have been known to occur during the summer months.

It is expected that this condition will improve to some extent as the land is cultivated, but people desiring to locate on this land are advised to make a personal inspection instead of trusting to any unofficial reports.

Funds Are Raised to Assist California Murderer.

Sympathetic Public Responds Liberally to an Appeal for Funds to Aid Slayer and Family.

San Francisco, Nov. 11.—Rarely has the taking of a human life aroused such sympathy for the slayer as in the case of Joseph Lococo, who shot and killed George Gray, of the contracting firm of Gray Brothers, yesterday because his family was starving and he could not collect wages due him.

Subscriptions for Lococo's family began pouring into the newspapers today and one daily opened a bureau for the handling of these funds. Another newspaper employed a battery of attorneys to defend Lococo. Policemen raised a fund among themselves and sent it to the slayer's wife and family.

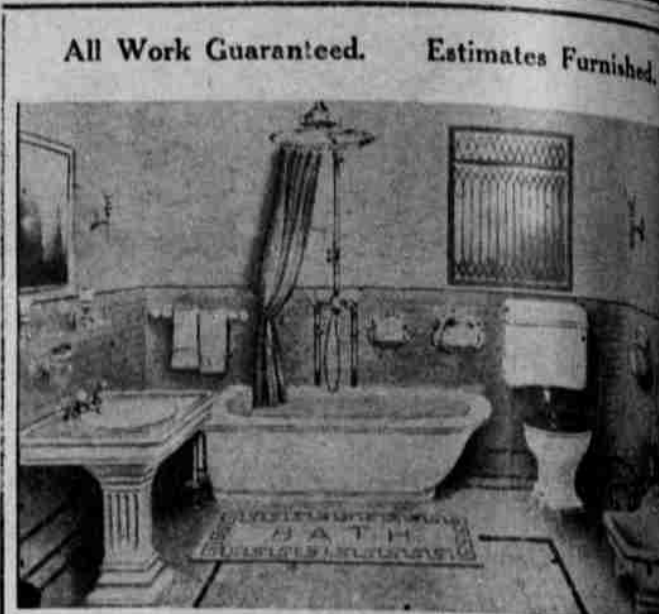
Lococo's defense, as outlined in the police court today, will be that he was maddened by hunger and worry over the suffering of his wife and two children and that when he fired upon Gray he believed the latter was about to strike him.

Los Angeles, Nov. 11.—The story of Joseph Lococo, who shot George Gray, a contractor, in San Francisco because the latter would not pay wages due, stirred sympathy here today for the slayer. Several persons called upon officers and the officers of news associations, asking for the address of the Lococo family, George Hazen, a merchant; L. Lee Dabbs, a banker from Oklahoma, and others made up a purse to be sent to Mrs. Lococo.

Mrs. Margaret Gray, divorced wife of George Gray, the contractor who was shot and killed by Joseph Lococo, declared tonight that she had no unkindly feeling toward Lococo, despite the fact that the shots he fired robbed her son and daughter of their father.

"I wish the man all the luck in the world," said Mrs. Gray. "I have not a bit of feeling against him. My sympathies go out to his wife and their babies."

These sentiments were echoed by Mrs. Milfred Wimberly, of Los Angeles, daughter of Gray by his first marriage, who was present when her mother made her statement of sympathy for Lococo.
