

STATE AND COUNTY

A new concrete jail is to be built at Aberdeen. Forest Grove is planning to install complete sewer system. Albany is endeavoring to secure Brownsville cannery. Warrenton has just installed a new light and power plant. A large gymnasium for boys is to be built at Oregon City. North Bend is planning a three-mile sewer, to cost \$25,000. Milwaukie is to expend \$40,000 on a municipal water plant. Portland spent \$4000 on the pamphlet for the city election. The Eugene broom factory is to manufacture maple broom handles. Five districts at Seaside have voted to establish a Union High School. The County Court at Oregon City has decided to install a large grave yard.

The Portland Gas and Coke Company is seeking a franchise at Milwaukie. Clackamas county has a \$10,000 damage suit growing out of a jitney accident. The minimum wage has been fixed at \$3.00 per day at Portland and \$2.00 at Salem.

Under the new law plants buying cream on butterfat basis must take out a state license. The Ashland High School will graduate 39 students on May 27, the largest class in its history. Word comes from Crowell that the paint mines located just east of here are to be developed soon.

Clackamas, Gladstone, Jennings and Park Place voted last week for a Union High School. Hood river strawberry growers are quite optimistic and predict a good field this season. The first car was shipped east. The Jackson County Creamery at Medford has leased the Weinhard beer and ice depot and will install modern creamery. The Normal School at Monmouth is to build and equip a \$50,000 training school all of Oregon materials and manufacture.

The new plant of the Bailey Mills company at Wheeler will begin work about July 1. Spruce box lumber is to be the present output. The I. O. O. F. grand lodge in session at Newport last week voted that Roseburg be the meeting place for the convention next year. Pacific University held their second annual May festival Friday. The occasion was a splendid success. Crowning the queen and festival songs closed the celebration.

The Forest Service has just completed the work on the largest single planting project ever undertaken in the Northwest, approximately one thousand acres having been covered this spring on Mt. Hebo in Tillamook county. On the invitation of the president of the Baker County Humane Society, the animal trainers of the Barnes' wild animal circus attended the Baker churches Sunday when humanity day was observed. Many of the performers were asked to speak in some of the pulpits.

E. Stockwell of the Clatskanie State Bank, died May 22. He had been in failing health for a long time, tuberculosis being the cause of his death. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Stockwell, Sr., and one brother, C. H. Stockwell, Jr., reside there, being associated in the banking business. His wife survives.

Action for damages in the sum of \$10,000 on account of injury to person alleged to have been occasioned by reason of a fall, caused by being frightened by a blast set off by the defendant near the home of the plaintiff, was brought by Sophia Salmi against the Columbia & Nehalem River R. R. in the Circuit Court at Clatskanie.

W. J. Messenger of Cottage Grove, is the owner of a jersey cow that gives milk testing 8 per cent butter fat and is said to be one of the richest milk producers in the country. It is claimed that not one cow in 5000 ever gives milk making this high test. The milk from the cow, he asserts never goes below 6 per cent. The animal produces about 24 pounds of milk a day.

Eugene Register: The architectural plans of a 12-year-old school may be accepted by the Dunn school board for additions to the school, located south of Eugene. The boy is Palmer Young, son of A. E. Young, a Eugene dentist, and attends the seventh grade school. Several other plans have been submitted by Eugene architects. The addition consists of three rooms, a hall, cloak room, lavatories and an entrance.

A bulky package left the University of Oregon a few days ago via parcel post addressed to Roger E. Pine, No. 27673 San Quentin Prison, Calif. The prisoner had made request by a letter to the department of geology at Salem for books and literature to assist him in a study of that science. His letter was forwarded to the university and Dr. W. D. Smith of the geological department mailed the books.

The first indications of real oil at the Central Oregon Oil & Gas Company's well at Burns, appeared Wednesday when a greasy scum spread over the water. The well is down 2550 feet; the first 400 feet is of 10-inch casing, the next 400 feet is of eight-inch casing and the remaining 1750 feet is of six-inch casing. The drill is 250 feet in a blue shale which cakes on the drill like heavy thick clay. It is necessary to force long pieces of wire cable down the well to keep the drill from sticking in the shale. Six men operate the drill. With these, the manager and two women made up the little colony which lived at the well all winter and drilled continually without a visitor and their nearest neighbor three miles distant. Because of the great distance to wood of any kind it is necessary to burn sagebrush.—Telegram.

President Gilman of the Hill lines stated at Cottage Grove that the company is conducting a series of observations and making surveys at Clear Lake, 75 miles up the McKenna, and will eventually construct immense power projects there, but at this time there is no movement to begin the actual construction. Sisualow on last Friday was in her glory celebrating the coming of the railroad and the appearance of a locomotive and a heavy steel train which awoke the silent hills and made glad the many long expectant hearts with its rumble and roar. It was the day of days in the Sisualow.

Arrangements are about completed by the officials of the Oregon Agricultural College for sending the Oregon boys and girls who won the trips to the Panama-Pacific Exposition. Superintendent H. C. Seymour and wife of Polk county, will have supervision of the party for the two weeks' stay. They start about the middle of June. The O. W. R. & N. Company will commence work on the new shops at The Dalles June 1. The work will be rushed to completion. The company proposes to spend a total of \$200,000 for improvements there. The new division terminals will be located in the eastern end of the city. New and modern brick machine shops, large enough to accommodate engines, a modern brick power plant and storeroom, and two miles of additional yard tracks will be constructed.
