DEEPENING OF CHANNEL BEGINS

Will Be Great Convenience to River Boats When Completed.

The port of Portland commission has ordered the dredging tug, Tualatin, to St. Helens to begin work dredging a channel across the sands from the end of Sauviss Island to the St. Helens docks. It is planned to have this channel at least 15 feet deep. With the present stage of water in the river it is necessary for river boats to go down opposite the St. Helens quarry before making the turn to come into St. Helens.

CHILD SUCCUMBS AFTER OPERATION

Ralph Alfred Soderberg, aged 4 years and 6 months, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Soderberg, died at a Portland hospital Friday morning at 6 o'clock, following an operation. The little fellow, on the Saturday before, complained of having a severe pain in his side. Physicians were called and administered temporary relief, but he grew worse until it was thought advisable to take him to the hospital. He never rallied from the operation, and died a few hours afterwards. The body was brought to St. Helens Saturday and interred in the cemetery at Yankton Sunday afternoon. Many friends attended the funeral and burial services, and extended sympathy to the bereaved parents.

ST. HELENS WILL HOLD FESTIVAL

Committee of Local People Plan Big Time.

If the plans of many people of St. Helens mean anything, the town will have a big time November 24, 25 and 27.

It is planned to hold St. Helens' first annual lyceum festival, which will mean three days of music, lectures and refined entertainments of the highest type.

A program to be given afternoon and evenings on the dates selected has been chosen from the Ellison White Chautauqua people. SCAFFOOSE RESIDENT DIES SUDDENLY
