CITATION

IN THE COUNTY COURT OF THE STATE OF OREGON FOR COLUMBIA COUNTY.

In the name of the State of Oregon:

You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable County Court of the State of Oregon in and for the County of Columbia at the Court House in the city of St. Helens, on the 5th day of November, 1917, at the hour of 9:30 A. M. on said day to show cause, if any exists, why the petition of Albert E. Newberg and Cecelia Newberg heretofore filed in said court, should not be granted, said petitioners Albert E. Newberg and Cecelia Newberg having petitioned the court that Robert Emanuel Lofgreen is the son of Catherine Lofgreen, now deceased, and Edward Lofgreen, now deceased, and that said parents have been divorced and that by said decree of divorce said mother was awarded the care and custody of said child, and ever since the time of her divorce until the time of her death, said child was in her care and custody; that said Edward Lofgreen, father of said child, has failed to support said child since his birth, and that the petitioners herein are husband and wife and residents of this county, and are financially able to properly support and educate said child; are of good moral character and repute, and they desire to adopt said child and change his name from Robert Emanuel Lofgreen to Robert Emanuel Newberg; and that the child's grandmother, Plaa Williams, and an aunt, Selma Newberg, signified their consent in writing that said adoption and change of name be made.

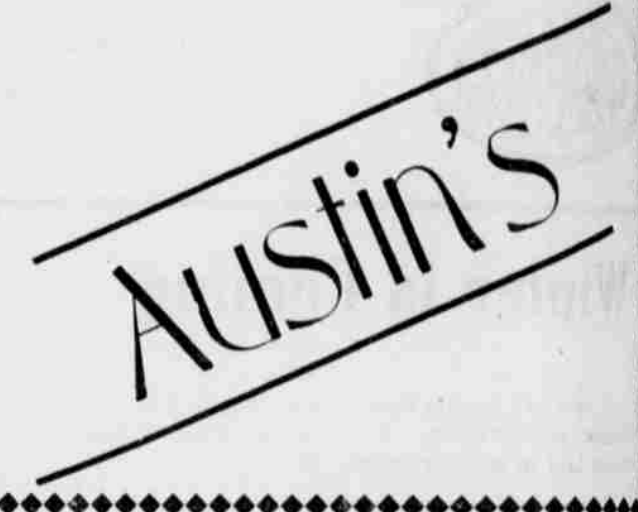
