A NATIONAL RAG-PICKER

If Great Britain can save that much in a single month on rags what could the United States save during the war on all the metal and other material that will be thrown away in Europe and at home?—Chicago Herald.

COURT PROCEEDINGS

(Continued from last week)

Due proclamation being made, the following proceedings were had. Journal read, approved and signed. On this 5th day of December, 1917, comes on for hearing the petition of D. Crowley et al. freeholders residing in the road district or districts of the said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a County Road described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the line between sections nine (9) and sixteen (16), said point being west four hundred sixty-two (462) feet from the corner of sections nine, ten, fifteen and sixteen in Township three (3) North, Range two (2) west of the W. M.; thence S. 8 degrees 30 minutes W. 4500 feet to the main south Scappoose Creek County Road. Said road to be forty (40) feet in width.

And it satisfactorily appearing to the Court from the proof filed herein that due notice of the pendency of this proceeding has been given as by law required, and that twelve of the said petitioners are residents and legal freeholders of this County residing in the Road District or Districts of the said proposed road, and that a good and sufficient bond has been given and filed herein:

It is therefore ordered by the Court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at the beginning point of the said proposed road on the 19th day of December, 1917, or on their failure to meet on said date, then within five days thereafter, and proceed to view, survey, locate and lay out the said proposed road.

It is further ordered by the Court that Mr. H. E. Abry, Mr. J. B. Duncan and Mr. H. West be appointed as a Board of Road Viewers for the purpose of laying out the said road.

On this day the report of the Viewers appointed to lay out a gateway as petitioned for by Mr. S. L. Butler, was read in open Court for the first time.

On this 5th day of December, 1917, comes on for hearing the claim of J. L. & L. B. Wickersham of Deer Island, Oregon, for indemnity in the amount of Twenty-Five Dollars, for one grade cow over the age of two years, slaughtered under the supervision of the State Live Stock Sanitary Board, under Chapter 14, General laws of 1913, and it appearing to the Court from the Certificates and Affidavits on file relative thereto, that said animal was slaughtered on the 22nd day of October, 1917, at Goble, Oregon, under the supervision of D. W. Mack, and that said claimant has complied with all the provisions of said Chapter 14 General Laws of 1913, and all laws relating thereto.

It is therefore ordered by the Court that said claim be, and the same is hereby allowed.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk be, and he is hereby authorized and instructed to issue a General Fund Warrant in the amount of \$12.50 in favor of the said J. L. & L. B. Wickersham, this amount being one-half of the sum so allowed as indemnity.

It is further ordered by the Court that the Clerk prepare and transmit to the Secretary of State, a certified copy of this order.

On this day it is ordered by the Court that Mr. H. E. Abry, Mr. J. M. Pointer and Mr. J. B. Duncan be and they are hereby appointed as a Board of County Road Viewers to survey, view and lay out the Chapman road, a Resolution for the establishment of which road was heretofore made by the County Court.

On this day it is ordered by the Court that Mr. H. E. Abry, Jan. Kennedy and Fritz Anliker be and they are hereby appointed as a Board of County Road Viewers to survey, view and lay out the Clark-Wilson Road, a Resolution for the establishment having been heretofore made by the County Court.

On this day the Clerk presents to the Court his statement of Scap Bounties issued during the month of November, as authorized by law and being as follows:

Nov. 12, 1917, Warrant No. 7150 for \$2.00 in favor of Geo. Adams, and the Court being advised in the matter, it is ordered that said statement be and the same is hereby approved and accepted.

On this day the Report of the Board of Viewers, appointed by the Court to survey and lay out a public Gateway as petitioned for by S. L. Butler, was read in open Court for the second time.
