Columbia County Asked to Assist in Good Road Program
The campaign for the Roosevelt highway which will extend from Clatsop county along the coast to the California line, is now under way.

Vice presidents have been appointed in each county in Oregon. In Clatsop county, A. W. Norblad is vice president and in Columbia county, S. C. Morton has been chosen as vice president.

The coast counties are practically isolated from the rest of Oregon so far as connecting roads are concerned. When the Roosevelt highway is built, that isolated section will be connected with the rest of Oregon.

Drove an Ammunition Wagon

Ralph Davie, a former resident of St. Helens, after joining the army, was assigned to the truck service. Arriving in France in July, 1918, he was assigned to an ammunition train, and lost no time in getting to the front.

When he lived in St. Helens, Davie worked for Elmer Blackburn and at the Columbia County Lumber company, and he has many friends here. His home is in Clatskanie.

A Strange Coincidence

Lon Christian enlisted in the engineers in Vancouver on June 4th, 1917. He gave his age as 57. Before enlisting he worked for C. Rabinsky, who has a ranch in the Dutch Canyon section. Rabinsky is a veteran of the German army. He was at Metz in 1871 when the French surrendered to the Germans.
