12 OREGON FARMERS GROW CERTIFIED SPUDS

Aim of Certification is to Supply Growers with Sound Seed

O. A. C., Corvallis—Twelve Oregon potato growers reached the standard of excellence required in growing certified seed potatoes, in 1918, and have received certificates. Seven of them grew their certified crops in Benton County, three in Lane, one each in Linn and Marion. The largest crop was 1950 sacks produced in Lane county. The total production was 5380 sacks.

The purpose of seed certification is to supply growers with potatoes that are disease-free, true to variety type, and of desirable market quality. The ultimate aim is to improve the quality, yield and market value of the Oregon potato crop and restore it to its former vantage point of preference over all others.

Any grower with a good strain may enter his field for certification. He must handle his crop in accordance with the recommendations of the official inspector, who will visit his field twice a year and inspect the plants. If not too badly mixed or affected with too much disease the crop is continued for certification.

After the potatoes are dug, sorted and stored, they are given final inspection, and if passed each sack will be tagged with the official certificate and may be offered at certified prices. Fees for certification run about \$2.00 to \$3.00 an acre.

A bulletin giving particulars has been published by the O. A. C. Extension Service and may be had free on application. Its writer is M. B. McKay, official inspector and associate plant pathologist.

Wants 500 Berry Pickers.

Loganberry pickers—500 of them—are wanted by Oregon growers. The call has been listed with the federal employment office at Portland, which has also received calls for strawberry pickers. The work of the O. A. C. and federal farm help specialist, J. W. Brewer, was so valuable last season that a great deal of reliance will be placed on him and the employment offices for supplying laborers this year.
