On this 4th day of June, 1919, comes on for hearing the petition of Thomas Pettijohn et al, freeholders residing in the road district or districts of said proposed road, praying for the establishment of a County Road described as follows:

Beginning at Stake "A" 84 paces West of Section line where it crosses County Road between Section 33-34 Township 5 N., R. 5 W., by C. W. Eichman's; thence west along the bottom at foot of hill, till you come to Stake "B," then cross the creek go west along the bottom till you come to County Road, and terminating at Stake "C" this being a distance of one mile more or less.

And it is further ordered by the Court that the Board of County Road Viewers meet at the beginning point of the said proposed road on the 24th day of June, 1919, at the hour of 9:30 A. M., or on their failure to meet on said date, then within ten days thereafter, but not otherwise, unless by order of said Court, and proceed to view, survey, lay out and locate said proposed road as set forth in said petition, and assess the damages and file your report on July 5th, 1919.

It is further ordered by the Court that Mr. H. E. Abry, Roadmaster, Mr. William Fringle and Mr. T. M. Tucker be, and they are hereby appointed as a board of road viewers to survey and view said road.
