Victor Furer of Rainier, at one time the champion athlete among the high schools of the county, came up from Rainier this morning.

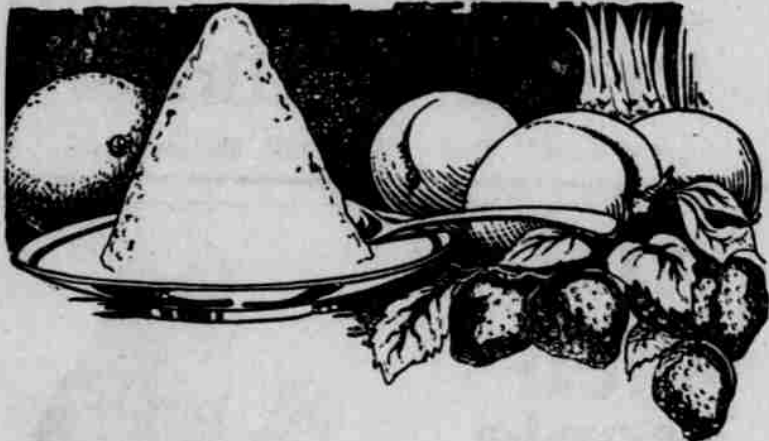
Thursday evening, after the regular session, the Rebecca lodge tendered Mr. and Mrs. Carl W. Aamand who were married last week, a reception.
