27, 1919, your remonstrance or re-
monstrances against the proposed
improvement or grade mentioned in
said resolution.

Whereas, the Common Council of
the City of St. Helens, Oregon, deem-
ing it expedient to improve all that
portion of Columbia street, in said
city, from the southerly line of
Cowlitz street to a point 406 feet
south of said south line of Cowlitz
street; and the westerly half of said
Columbia street from said point 406
feet south of the south line of Cow-
litz street to the center line of Tual-
atin street, and also all of McCormick
street from the center line of Colum-
bia street to the westerly edge of the
Strand, all in said city, by grad-
ing, curbing and paving the same,
according to the plans and specifica-
tions mentioned in the following
paragraph herein:

And Whereas, the engineer of said
city on the 19th day of May, 1919, at
the request of said council, filed in
the office of the city recorder of said
city, plans, specifications and esti-
mates of the probable cost of such
improvement of said streets, the es-
timate of which said cost as made by
said city engineer is \$2713.68.

And Whereas, the Common Coun-
cil of said city, having examined said
plans, specifications and estimates of
the probable cost finds the same to
be satisfactory in all particulars,
without making any changes there-
in:

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved,
By the Common Council of the City
of St. Helens, Oregon, that all of
Columbia street from the southerly
line of Cowlitz street to a point 406
feet south of the south line of Cow-
litz street; the westerly half of said
Columbia street from said point 406
feet south of the southerly line of
Cowlitz street to the center line of
Tualatin street; and also all of Mc-
Cormick street, in said city, be im-
proved by grading, curbing and pav-
ing the same with some approved
type of pavement, all in accordance
with the established grade, and the
plans and specifications of the city
engineer on file in the office of the
recorder of said city, and said com-
mon council hereby declares its in-
tention, and it is its intention to so
improve said portion of said Colum-
bia street and all of said McCormick
street; and

Be It Further Resolved, that the
Common Council of said city adopt
and approve, and it does hereby
adopt and approve said plans, spec-
ifications and estimates of the prob-
able cost of said improvements,
which probable cost, as shown by
said city engineer's estimate, is the sum
of \$2713.68;

And Be It Further Resolved, That
the cost of said improvements be
levied upon and assessed against all
the lots, parts of lots and parcels of
land specially benefited by such im-
provements, as required and directed
by the charter of said city; and it is
hereby determined and declared that
all the lots of land specially ben-
efited directly or indirectly, are the
following, to-wit: All that portion of
Lot 5, not included in McCormick
street, and Lots 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 17,
and all that portion of Lot 18 not
included in McCormick street; all in
Block 10, in said City of St. Helens;
and all of Lots 12, 13, 14, 15,
16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22 in
Block 19, in said city; and all of
said above described lots are hereby
deemed to be specially and directly

PROHIBITION ACT
UPHELD BY COURT

New York—The war time prohibi-
tion act under which no liquor may
be sold after July 1, was upheld by
the United States circuit court of
appeals. The court virtually dis-
missed the injunction Judge Mayer
sought the brewers, restraining the
local district and internal revenue
collector from enforcing war time
prohibition, as applied to 2.75 per
cent beer.
The court held the act was constitu-
tional and Judge Mayer had no jur-
isdiction to enjoin the enforcement
of a constitutional act.
The court recommended that the
district attorney hasten final determi-
nation on the issue in the highest
court and in the meantime interfere
with the business of brewers as little
as possible.
