DAYLIGHT LAW TO REMAIN EFFECTIVE

After Congress Fails to Pass it Over President's Veto May Run to 1921

Washington—The daylight saving plan under which the clocks of the country are turned back one hour in March and then ahead an hour in October, will be continued indefinitely. This was assured when, following President Wilson's veto of the agricultural appropriation bill carrying a rider repealing the daylight law, the house refused by a vote of 237 to 135 to pass the measure over the president's veto.

House advocates of the repeal stated that after the agricultural bill had been sent back to the committee that no further effort at this session perhaps not in this congress, which continues in existence until March, 1921, to wipe out the daylight saving act.

PORTLAND LIBRARIES BAN FOREIGN TONGUES

Discontinuance of including foreign language newspapers in the files of the Portland public library, as suggested by William F. Woodward, a member of the library board of directors, will likely come up for discussion at the next meeting of the library board.

Mr. Woodward urges the board to bar all foreign language papers as a step toward Americanization, and also contends that in the light of past events it would be wise policy for the board to put the complete ban on all newspapers and magazines which are not published in the American language.

The suggestion was referred to the book committee, of which Rabbi Jonah B. Wise is chairman, and it is probable that this committee will submit a resolution and recommendations at the coming meeting.

The foreign language newspapers which are now on file at the public library include German, Finnish, Polish, Spanish, Swedish, Norwegian, Lithuanian and Italian periodicals.

RECIPES

Stuffed Potato

Wash thoroughly medium sized potatoes and peel. With an apple corer push down through the middle to the bottom and remove the core thus made. Fill the cavity remaining with well seasoned sausage, and pour over the drippings. Bake until potatoes are done. They should be an appetizing brown.

Breakfast Coffee

Have the coffee pot scalded. Allow one heaping tablespoonful of freshly ground coffee for each cup of boiling water. Put the coffee in the scalded pot after mixing it to a paste with a little cold water, then pour over it the boiling water and boil for five minutes. Remove the grounds that rise with a spoon, add a few crushed shells of raw eggs and a spoonful of cold water.

Scalloped Carrots

Two tablespoons fat, two table spoons flour, one cup milk and carrot stock mixed, salt and pepper to taste. Wash and scrape the required number of carrots. Slice very thin and cook until tender in just enough salted water to prevent them from burning. Drain, saving the stock. Melt the fat, add flour and seasoning and stir until well-blended. Next add the cup of liquid. Cook the mixture until it thickens. Mix sauce with the cooked carrots. Put in oiled baking dish, sprinkle with crumbs and bake until delicately browned.

Johnny Cake

Johnny Cake—No. 1: One pint sour milk or buttermilk, one egg, two tablespoons flour, one teaspoonful salt, one teaspoonful soda, dissolved in hot water. Mix the egg, milk and flour, and add enough meal to make a thick batter, and finally add salt and soda after being dissolved in the hot water. Beat very rapidly, and bake quickly and steadily.

Johnny Cake—No. 2: One egg, two cups cornmeal, two-thirds cup flour, three tablespoons sugar, two teaspoons baking powder, milk enough to make it soft.
